"When Constabulary Duties To Be Done . . ."

A recent report praised the Northamptonshire Police Force as being the most efficient and forward looking Force in the Country. The Chief Constable and his Colleagues should be congratulated on this accolade.

However, it is to be hoped that in their euphoria they do not continue to "overlook" the ever increasing disquiet still held by residents in the villages such as Bugbrooke at being deprived of their Village "Bobby".

Reports reaching "LINK" speak of increased vandalism, obscene graffiti in the bus shelter, cars – some defiantly – parking on double yellow lines, bicycles being ridden amongst the graves in the churchyard, motor bikes being ridden across the playing fields, continuing fouling of pavements and public places by dogs etc. etc.

So far the Neighbourhood Watch in the village have done a very good job – what a pity it is that the law does not grant them the "teeth" to deal with some of these local problems. Could it be that regular patrols might, at least, identify and discourage some of the perpetrators.

One Short!

As reported elsewhere in David Harries' Parish Council Notes this village was, in May, deprived of an election for Members of the Parish Council as only fourteen names were put forward for 15 vacancies . . . and this in a village with a population of well over two thousand!

Not only does this deprive the voters of exercising their right of choice it also obviates any satisfaction any individual Councillor might gain by having his or her "acceptability" confirmed by the electorate.

Parish Councils are traditionally the only level of local government which are non political; it is to be hoped that at the next Parish Council election the situation will be reversed and meetings will produce healthy debate by Councillors confirmed by the voters as their choice.

Parish Council - May 1991

The anticipated Parish Council Elections did not take place. The reason for this is that, despite having a population of around 3,000, only 14 people expressed an interest in standing for election to Bugbrooke Parish Council. As a village of this size is entitled to the maximum of 15 Parish Councillors an election was not necessary. Apathy reigns supreme! The magnificent 7 x 2 are:-

Phil Bignell, John Curtis, Dr Dipak Dutta, Ken Gardner, David Harries (Vice-Chairman), Jack Holt, Aubrey Howard, Alf Oliver (Chairman), Mrs Sue Pace, Dr David Paine, the Reverend Tim Partridge, Mrs Kathleen Riggall, John Sexton and Mrs Jennifer Strike.

As anticipated, there are few changes; John Hawkins and Mrs Linda Pope decided not to stand again and we welcome Phil Bignall as a new member. The vacancy which remains will be filled by co-option.

The "new" Parish Council were very quickly wrestling with a number of old problems.

The growing season is upon us once again - and once again there are complaints of hedges, shrubs and trees overhanging footpaths. All those people with such foliage are asked to ensure that it does not encroach upon public paths or roads. Continuing the theme of paths and roads, which generally produces lively discussion and debate, a reply has been received from the Highways Authority following the Parish Council's request for the replacement of the barriers at "Knitters Grave" on the B4525. Apart from the usual lament about limited funds available for maintenance, the County Surveyor explained that it was difficult to justify the replacement of these barriers as they clearly offered little or no protection. This seems to be borne out by the regular appearance of vehicles in the ditch and simultaneous disappearance of various sections of the barrier. Taking up a suggestion from John Curtis, the Parish Council will now propose that the problem could be resolved by re-aligning the dangerous bend in the road at this point, which would still leave the less severe bend to reduce the speed of traffic entering the village.

With the likely introduction of Dog Wardens by South Northamptonshire District Council, there was speculation about the possibility of declaring certain parts of the village as dog free areas. Those which came immediately to mind were the schools, the church and the playing fields. However, as Samuel Johnson said of second marriages, it seems to be the triumph of hope over experience.

The Parish Council continue to receive complaints about petty vandalism and general anti-social behaviour by youths. Specific incidents and general observations will be reported regularly to the Police in order to draw their attention to potential problem areas, particularly at a time when we have no local bobby with local knowledge to nip trouble in the bud.

Bad news for allotment holders. The Water Authority has estimated the charge for laying the appropriate pipes to supply water to the allotment site to be in the region of £1,000. Needless to say the Parish Council do not feel able to justify this level of expense. Other possible sources are under consideration.

Finally, the District Council have formally declared a fairly large part of the village to be a conservation area. This involves the area along the High Street and much of the land to the west. This is one of a number of initiatives and good intentions regarding litter, dogs and conservation matters – although little seems to change!

Now to think about fruit trees. Has anyone ever seen apple blossom looking more beautiful? The number of apples is unbelievable. They should be cheap to buy. The pear crop is very good too but I believe some of the early plums caught the frost.

The cool weather is not affecting the hawthorn hedges, is it? They are beautiful and white at the moment. There should be a wonderful crop of haws for the birds to feed on.

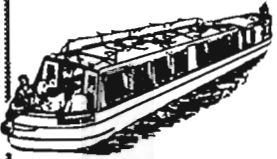

Now to bird sightings. When Mr Neary was building that lovely fence at the bottom of the church yard, he said to me, "I have never seen your kingfisher." This morning, 30th May, I saw him near his house and he said, "I have just seen a lovely kingfisher near the clapper bridge, it was a beautiful blue." Sue Nightingale was helping her husband when he was cutting the grass in the churchyard. She said to me, "Have you seen that hen pheasant along the Heyford road that is nearly white?" I said I had not. Only this morning the spotted flycatcher has been taking a bath on the bird table. I do hope it builds its nest somewhere in the garden. Julian Moulton told me that he had heard a grasshopper warbler singing near the clapper bridge! My daughter said she was in her greenhouse and a cuckoo came and sat on top of it. It stayed for ages and ages looking at the hedges nearby. I leave it to your imagination as to what it would have done if it had seen a hedge sparrow pop into its nest.

The swallows, martins and swifts are all back with us, I would think there are not too many flies for them.

Aren't we lucky to have so many blackbirds about? I do not sleep too well in the early morning and I often come down for a cup of tea. About two minutes past four every morning, the first blackbird wakes up and starts that dawn chorus off. I really think the song of the blackbird is better than that of the thrush. The chorus builds up and in a few minutes hundreds of birds are singing. You must all get up one of these mornings and enjoy the best half hour of the day!!

P.S. 1st June, I have just read in the paper that we have had the driest May on record. In the Anglian region there may be severe restrictions. Rain please come.

Gardening Notes July & August

July can be the warmest month of the year and can also be the wettest month of the summer. Heavy showers or thunderstorms are probable in all areas. St Swithin's day coming on the 15th of the month.

Flower Garden

During dry weather water lawns as soon as a dry spell arrives. When brown patches appear it is difficult to restore the green appearance of grass. Apply fungicides and selective weedkiller during moist growing weather.

Stake gladioli to provide straight stems. Water chrysanthemums

regularly in continuously dry weather. Feed dahlias every 14 days with a liquid fertiliser not forgetting the fuschias and chrysanthemums.

Brompton stocks, pansies, lupins and primulas should be sown this month. Cuttings of lavender and rhododendrons can also be taken now. Take heeled cuttings of lavender, plant in a bed of peat and sand. Cuttings of lavender can also be taken in September and October. Remove growing tips of rhododendrons four or five inches long, if leaves are large cut them in half, then strike them in pots of peaty compost and cover pots with plastic bags.

Vegetables

Continue planting out brussel sprouts and broccoli. Sow a few more carrots and beetroot using the early varieties. Sow parsley now for winter use. Water marrows and runner beans during dry spells. Plant out leeks. Sow swedes by middle of month. Ease shallots up with fork as leaves start to yellow, it will help ripen them off.

August

The nights are lengthening in August. Weather generally follows the same pattern as July. Thunderstorms are likely to be severe when they occur.

Flower Garden

Inspect the lawn, continue to apply fungicides and selective weedkiller. Remove faded blooms from your rose trees. Do not apply rose fertilisers after the end of July, as they would encourage late, soft growth that would not mature before winter. Hardy herbaceous plants need dead heading. Most kinds will show new growth at ground level and these do not need cutting back. Now is the time to plan next year's border.

Continue to spray dahlias against pests. Inspect plants for discolouration of foliage, these are best destroyed.

Buds will form rapidly on your chrysanthemums grown outdoors. If you like large blooms, disbud the plants to one flower per stem.

Continue to trim fast growing hedges such as privet and lonicera. Hoe out bottom of hedge to remove weeds.

This is the best time to take geranium cuttings. Choose medium sized shoots about 3 inches long, place three or four cuttings around a flower pot filled with peat and sand. Plant daffodil bulbs this month but wait until next month before planting tulips.

Bugbrooke Old Age Pensioners Christmas Gift Scheme

Important Notice

It has become increasingly difficult to get to know of those ladies and gentlemen who have attained the age of 65 years and are consequently entitled to a gift under the above scheme.

A number of our usual sources of information as to when people have attained the age of 65 are no longer available to us due to new legislation such as the Data Protection Act.

Due to some of these sources "drying up" we are now going to have to rely on pensioners themselves, relatives, friends or neighbours to inform us of anyone who has reached the age of 65 years by the 25th December, 1991. *This will also have to include everyone who has previously benefited from the scheme.*

The next issue of "Link" will contain a tear off slip which should be completed either by or on behalf of an old age pensioner and forwarded to one of the collecting stations which will be shown on the slip or sent by post to one of the addresses of the officers of the scheme which will also be shown to ensure that you receive the gift which is provided under the rules of the Scheme.

Remember, *if you do not apply*, you will not be eligible to receive a gift under the Scheme whether or not you have received one before, so please make sure that you fill in your application and send it in.

The only qualifications are that you must be aged 65 years by the 25th December, 1991 and you should be resident in Bugbrooke for the major part of the year.

The only exceptions to the above qualifications will be:-

- Those ladies under 65 years of age who have previously received a gift from the Scheme before the rules were amended.
- Those persons who through old age or illness are now resident in

Around the turn of the century Bugbrooke Primary School had a remarkable headmaster in Mr Frank Wright. He constructed a wireless set and taught the children how to maintain and use it. 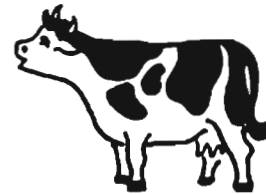

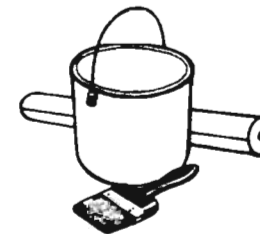
