Parish Council Meetings

January and February 1993

This year sees the Gilkes family complete 80 continuous years of providing the Clerk to the Parish Council. The present Clerk, Harry Gilkes, has been in office for 33 years. This remarkable and probably unique record was duly recorded. It is unlikely to be equalled or repeated anywhere in the country.

The future use of the Village Hall continues to be considered. A special public meeting was held on 15th February in view of the work in the building required by the Environmental Health Officer. It is clear that the Village Hall does not generate anything like enough money to meet the cost of all the work suggested. (It is also well beyond the financial capability of the Parish Council.) It was suggested that, if no cooking facilities were required, the necessary work (and corresponding cost) would be reduced considerably. The Village Hall Committee are discussing this possibility with the Environmental Health Officer; and the Parish Council will again be approached when likely costs are known. The heart of the problem, however, is the fact that grants are not available from District or County Council because the building is owned by the Trustees and there is no requirement for it to remain as a community facility. Clearly, even with the best of intentions from all concerned, the existing building cannot be considered an adequate long-term facility for a village the size of Bugbrooke. Plans for a community centre on the playing fields site have already been lodged with the District Council and this remains the best hope for such a facility. I gather that there is a Village Hall representative on the Playing Fields Committee and so the obvious connection already exists.

Officers from South Northamptonshire Council have been invited to a future meeting of the Parish Council to discuss the possibility of providing "affordable housing" in Bugbrooke. If a suitable site can be found for a reasonable number of starter homes then such a scheme may be worth considering. Watch this space!

The scheme to replace existing wooden poles holding streetlights with underground cables along the High Street should be worth the mud and disruption the work causes. The area should be enhanced by the stylish black columns and white lights which will replace the unsightly poles. An additional benefit is the two extra lights being erected: one opposite the Post Office and one on the corner of Great Lane opposite Elm Tree Bank. It might also be possible to use some of the lamps removed to improve lighting elsewhere in the village.

sparrow or dunnock. It is very seldom on the table but it stays on the ground underneath and clears up all the little bits of food that the others have dropped. I do so well remember, as a boy, looking into a hedge sparrow's nest and seeing that a rather large grey bird from Africa had taken one of the blue eggs out and left one of its own in its place. You may hear the grey male bird in a couple of months time!

Writing about large grey birds, we had one fly over the hedge with a collared dove in its talons. It landed on the lawn and we watched as it plucked feather after feather from the dove. When it flew away I went to inspect the spot. It was just a mass of feathers. The bird was a sparrowhawk and I think there are quite a number about. The other hawk we see hovering near a motorway is a kestrel of course.

Looking up at the lime trees in the churchyard, I see the rooks have made a good start. There are two large nests and several others started. The usual stealing of nest material is going on but they will sort it all out in the end.

I went with Jim down to Somerset on the 15th February and we saw three lovely badgers dead at the side of the road. Reading Eric Roberts nature notes in the Chronicle some time later, he said that badgers in mid February would be cleaning out their winter bedding. What a shame we drive too fast to miss them!

Towards the end of the February notes I said I had seen a wonderful television programme on flamingoes. Well, last night there was an even better wildlife programme on chimpanzees. This sort of programme is so wonderful isn't it? News, whether local or worldwide, is so depressing and I find it is often better not to know about it.

Things are looking up! My friend, on top of the church is now staring towards Heyford. Temperatures must rise!

The daffodils beside the church car park and in other parts of the village are now showing no end of buds. They will look lovely in a week or so. I see from this morning's paper we can send names in and get one or two of you a medal!

Several nature sightings about the village. A mink, running across the ice on the canal at the bottom of Bird's Hill. A little owl perching on a post near Cornhill and a negative sighting, our nuthatches have deserted us and have returned to the woods.

P.S. I have just taken the notes along to Mr Sexton and I have seen that wonderful sign of Spring. Lovely little lambs running across the field behind the church.

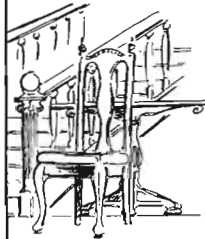

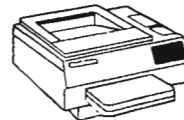

Essential Family Reading Matter

Most people know that the book with the highest sales in the world is the Holy Bible. It is rare to find a home which does not have a copy. Indeed, in days of yore, it was used to record a family's tree in the fly-leaf.

There is another book which *should* be in every home, although, sad to say, this is not the case. This is the Highway Code which has been re-issued in a new edition priced at 99p (under £1!!). This is a safety guide for all road users. Non-observance of the code is not in itself an offence (some believe that it is now time that it should be), although it may be used to confirm or negate the evidence in legal proceedings. The code refers to its "Rules". This cannot be for they do not have the force of law. Anyway, rules are for fools.

Have you noticed how actors on TV and in films turn in deep conversation, while driving, to face their passengers. Although not highlighted in the code, this is a very dangerous practice even for one fleeting moment which can result in death or serious injury. Just as bad is the person who drives in hot weather with an elbow resting on the window sill and a hand holding the roof down - the shirt sleeve acts like a ship's ventilator causing cool air to circulate round the body. This is also not a good idea, for I have on several occasions in the past had to collect from the roadway the lower arm below the elbow which had been amputated by a passing vehicle. The code's advice for both these situations is hidden in Paragraph 42 which merely requires a driver to be in full control of the vehicle at all times.

Mention is made in Paragraphs 48 and 51 of using signals before moving out or making a manoeuvre. It is not mentioned that such a

signal merely indicates an intention and does not allow a driver to perform his intention unless the road is clear so to do.

We used to have headlights and parking lights. One set was used when driving and the other when the vehicle was stationary. We now have sidelights – which is strange because they are not at the side – and Paragraph 131 instructs us to use them between sunset and sunrise. This would not be so ambiguous if “when parking on the public highway” had been added.

Tucked away in Paragraph 137 is the very sound advice not to disgorge your passengers or goods into the centre of the road but rather onto the roadside. Though not mentioned, it is just as important to use the roadside when loading your vehicle.

You are advised in Paragraph 142 to park at night on the left side of the road facing in the same direction as that of moving traffic. This is just as important in fog, although you are not told so.

Cyclists are advised not to ride along drainage channels at the road side (Paragraph 195). Is this the latest name for a gutter? In my experience, a drainage channel is at least four feet deep and just as wide and is to be found in the Fens and the Tropics.

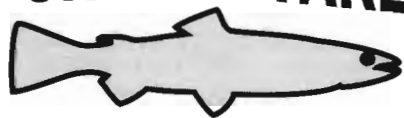
In the pretty pictures at the back we find a policeman beckoning traffic from the rear while he has his eyes to the front. As a sprog copper (in the days when “The Blue Lamp” was an official police training film), I was taught to look at the driver when giving traffic signals. Although you are not told to do so, you should pass to the front or rear of a policeman on point duty according to where his hand signals indicates. Missing from the illustrations are those beautiful shire horses and the draymen showing how to signal with a whip.

There are many items which could have been mentioned but, no doubt, space and cost precluded them. Had stopping distances not been duplicated in Paragraph 57 and on the back cover, it might have been possible to advise drivers of the Continental zip system used where a road narrows. In this system (which is law in some countries just as most of our Highway Code is applied as law in some foreign countries) one car enters the narrow road from the left lane followed by one from the right lane, and so on. Another excellent Continental law is that all children under 12 years of age have to be carried in the back seats.

Hopefully this small sample of the contents of the 1993 edition will have whetted your appetite sufficiently to pop along to the newsagents and get a copy for a family reading session. How about having a quiz when you get bored with “Eldorado” or “Neighbours” or even Terry Wogan.

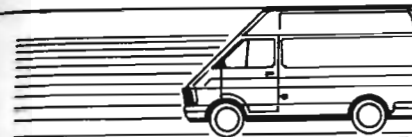
Bugbrooke Youth Club

Betty's Pantry – Winter Warmers

Parsnip Soup

3oz butter
4oz onion (chopped)
1lb parsnips (cubed)
1 garlic clove (crushed)
1oz flour
1 rounded tsp curry powder
2 pints beef stock
salt
black pepper (ground)
¼ pint single cream
chopped chives

Melt the butter in a large pan, add the onion, parsnip & garlic, fry gently for 5 minutes. Stir in the flour and curry powder, cook for a minute, then blend in the stock and seasoning. Bring to the boil, stirring, then cover and simmer gently for about 20 minutes, until the parsnip is tender. Sieve or purée in a processor or blender.

Reheat until hot, taste and check seasoning. Stir in the cream just before serving, sprinkle chives on top.

Sausage and Tomato Bake

½lb sausages
6oz onion (finely chopped)
14oz tin chopped tomatoes. Drained and liquid made up to ¾ pint with water
chicken stock cube
1 tsp curry powder
2–3oz long grain rice

Heat oven to 180°C – 350°F – Gas mark 4.

Place all ingredients apart from the sausages into a covered casserole dish. Cook for about 45 minutes. Grill sausages. When cooked cut into bite size pieces. Put sausage pieces into casserole during last 15 minutes of cooking time.
