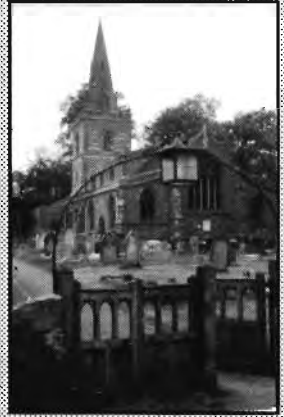

Parish Council - March and April 1993

Regular reader(s) will know of the Parish Council's frequent requests for any residential development to include some starter homes and/or retirement bungalows. In response to this the Parish Council were recently addressed by two senior officers of South Northamptonshire Council about a scheme for the provision of affordable housing. It involves planning permission being given to a small parcel of land partly or wholly outside the boundary for development within the village provided it is used to build properties which are required by the village. If such a suitable site was available the District Council would put the Parish Council in touch with a Housing Association who would organise the development of the site with a mixture of smaller properties for sale, rent or a combination of both, particularly for Bugbrooke residents and their families. 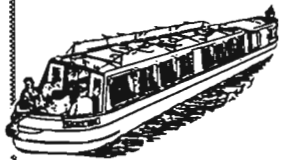

ected to consider this proposal and our first task is to establish details of the need by preparing an appropriate form for a housing needs survey to be carried out throughout the village.

The Charity Commission have provided a draft revised scheme for the Playing Fields Association which has caused a few hearts to flutter in the Parish Council by placing the Council as Custodian Trustee. This, together with the request from the Playing Fields Association for the Parish Council to become more actively involved in the efforts to provide a community hall, has produced anxious questions about the Council's legal liability. Consequently the National Association for Local Councils are to be consulted before any rash promises are made.

The Parish Council's cautious attitude continued in response to a request to review our possible continued interest in providing a Pocket Park in the village. A possible site has been identified and a current evaluation will be sought before it is considered further. The attraction is that, apart from the 75% grant for the provision of a Pocket Park, it might also be possible to obtain an 'environmental enhancement' grant, leaving the Parish Council with little or nothing to pay. However, the longer term question of upkeep, maintenance and the general burden of the day to day responsibility for such a venture will also need to be given careful consideration.

Sue Pace, the co-ordinator of Operation Springclean in Bugbrooke, was able to report that the operation found less litter in the village than in previous years. This good news is due mainly to the continued efforts of Colin Nuttall, Roy Smith, William Lantsbury and Michael Attack. If this continues we might even create history by winning an award in the tidy village competition for the third consecutive year.

Apart from counting litter, Sue Pace has also been counting cars (and lorries) in a traffic survey carried out in an attempt to improve our chance of getting traffic calming measures in the village. The results should move us up the league table maintained by the Highway Authority although their funds for this purpose are apparently fully committed for the whole of this year.

The annual ritual of five minutes break during the annual parish meeting for bids to rent Charity Meadow is now a thing of the past. Taking insurance into account the trustees are barely breaking even and have decided that a long lease would more accurately meet the terms of the Trust which require income to be made from the land. It is hoped, however, that its status as a Site of Special Scientific Interest will continue to be taken into consideration.

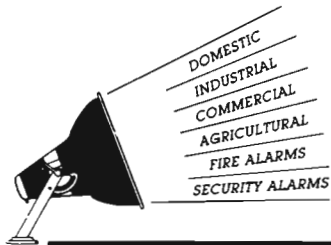

level crossing at Rothersthorpe and so it will be closed from 10 p.m. on Saturday the 12th June to 8 a.m. on Monday the 23rd June and again from 11 p.m. on Saturday the 30th July to 8 a.m. on Monday the 9th August.

A public meeting to discuss policing in Bugbrooke and the surrounding area has been arranged by the Police to take place at the Primary School from 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday the 26th May. If you are concerned about increasing crime in rural areas this is the meeting to attend. The standard response to the regular question raised is that the Force is organised efficiently in the circumstances and the day of the village bobby has gone forever. Nonetheless, we live in hope.

The Parish Council have asked for barriers to be erected at either end of the new Pound Lane/Pilgrims Lane footpath (even though it is not yet adopted) despite the fact that equal opportunities legislation now apparently requires them to be sufficiently spaced apart to allow wheelchairs (and of course cycles and motor cycles) to pass through unhindered.

Finally, Parish Councillors were astounded to hear Canon Partridge talk of relieving himself on footpaths, but were themselves relieved when he explained that it was the relief of walking rather than cycling to which he referred.

Churchyard Conservation Area

Those of you who use Ace Lane regularly may have noticed considerable activity in the conservation area over the last few weeks.

As this area is unsuitable for burial it has been designated for wildlife conservation and I have been contacting various organisations over recent months seeking expert advice on how to manage the site.

Work has begun on creating a rockery area between the two levels under the trees. Primroses, Cowslips, Violets and Forget-me-nots have been planted in keeping with the churchyard flora together with some other nectar plants to attract bees and butterflies. (Many thanks to those who donated plants). Also, a herb hedge has been planted along the boundary with the new burial area and this should also attract bees and butterflies once the flowers appear.

A representative from FWAG (Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group) has been to look at the site and advise us on hedge planting along the fences bordering the brook and the lane. His opinion was that we had a wonderful small site. The rough grass will provide ideal habitat for

shrews and other small mammals while the nettles should attract butterflies to lay their eggs. So keep your ears and eyes open and tread carefully.

He also advised us on the upkeep of the new hedgerow along the boundary with the field. We should allow this to grow to a height of six to eight feet with sufficient diameter to permit proper hedge laying. This will provide a good solid field hedge without gaps once it has been laid but it could take three to four years to attain the necessary dimensions for laying.

Over the May Day bank holiday we were visited by representatives of BSBI (Botanical Society of the British Isles) who were in the area doing a survey on flora of the county. They had a quick look at the site and have provided a list of the flora found. Their advice is to treat the area as a hay meadow and cut the grass at the end of June.

One of the botany recorders had just returned from a trip to Crete and told me of a plaque he came across while there.

"We have not inherited the earth from our parents,
we have borrowed it from our children."

This is very true and if we can all do our bit to preserve the countryside around us and make every effort to leave this world a little better than we found it, then maybe the children will have a better place to grow up in.

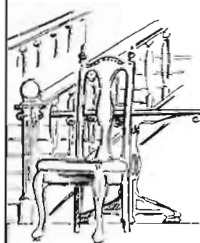

Grand Union Canal Walk

As you may know, this year is the 200th anniversary of the building of the Grand Union Canal. The canal runs from Little Venice, London to Gas Street Basin, Birmingham with branches to Slough, Wendover, Aylesbury and Northampton covering a total of 145 miles.

During this summer many people will be walking the tow-path to rediscover the history and wildlife of this canal.

The official opening of this walk will be on 4th/5th July when parties will leave Gas Street Basin and Little Venice to meet at Stoke Bruerne on 9th July.

A letterbox system will be employed where walkers have their passport stamped at several checkpoints along the route, thus qualifying for an official certificate.

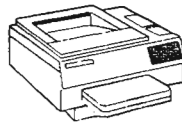

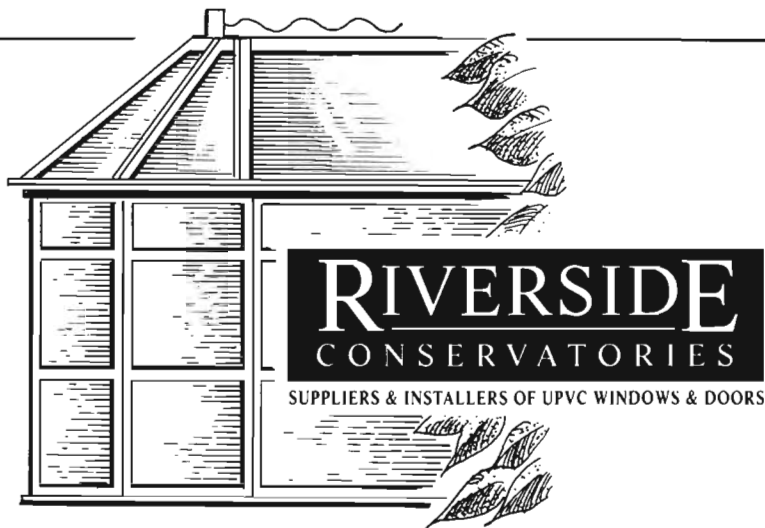
At our meeting in May we have a craft evening planned and the National Federation of Women's Institute's Resolutions will be discussed.

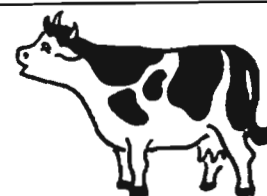



Andy Butler and family are shortly off to Australia, so missing a good part of season and we wish them well. Perhaps a tour could be arranged?

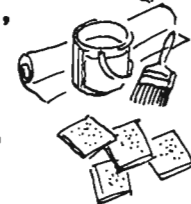
