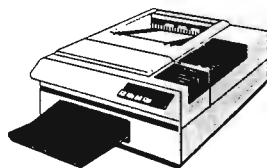

## Parish Council Meeting - May and June 1994

The number of highways issues to be addressed continues to increase. The Parish Council are concerned to ensure that whatever limited money is available is spent on the most worthwhile projects. It would be quite unfair to give priority to schemes simply because its supporters shout the loudest or receive the most publicity. Consequently, a Working Group has been established to prioritise all the known problem areas, their task will not be easy! The Group must carefully balance conflicting factors such as short and long term benefit, cost, value for money and impact on the village. One thing is guaranteed - whatever the outcome it will not please everybody.

Continuing the highways theme, the Parish Council are grateful for the supply of gritbins that have been provided after many years of asking. Unfortunately, for an as yet unexplained reason one of the gritbins was delivered with a gap at the bottom - and subsequently filled with rock salt. The obvious result has been a potentially damaging spread of salt down footpath KD9 (Ash Grove to High Street). The Highway Authority has promised to remove and replace this offending bin but, at present, it remains spewing salt.

The countryside walks leaflets have proved to be very popular. The first batch on sale at the Post Office has already been cleared and a second order is being provided. Perhaps this new found interest in walking means a bumper crowd at the centenary walk taking place on Sunday the 17th July. The walk has been arranged as part of the celebration of 100 years of Parish Councils. It has been carefully chosen for a panoramic view of the village. Lasting only 1½ to 2 hours it allows plenty of time to recover before slumping before the television for the World Cup final.

South Northamptonshire Council have accepted Elmtree Bank (the green on the High Street at the top of Great Lane/Ace Lane) as a suitable project for receipt of an Environmental Enhancement Grant. The difficulty is that the original, rather grandiose, scheme involving bollards and ornamental chain link fencing, would be hugely expensive - bearing in mind that the Parish Council must meet half the cost. The newly formed Highways Working Group have been asked to come up with a more sensible scheme.

A little money might be available to help fund some of the work necessary, or simply desirable, in the village. The Parish Council were delighted to hear the Clerk confirm that the rebate applied for early in the year has been received. A princely sum of £2,700 has now been added to the coffers.

### Nature Notes by Bill Lantsbery

I am starting to write these notes on 7th July and yesterday, Jim from next door, took me to Banbury and Chipping Norton. On the way back we came through a thunder storm and in the whole of my life I have never seen rain fall so heavily. The roads in Banbury turned into rivers. I feel certain parts must have flooded. Of course when I reached home we had just had a couple of showers!

I won't stay on the weather too long but I can't help feeling that many things are excessive nowadays. The heat of the sun is a bit much. One is told not to stay out in it above so many minutes. Have we ruined the atmosphere with our vehicles? I am certain some will say there is nothing to worry about but just a few days ago when there was an accident on the M1 and the cars and lorries were just creeping along for five hours, I would think the air above that road was pretty foul.

Now to the birds. We have been lucky with nests this year. When the sun was so hot we could sit in the shade and watch the blackbirds and the robins feeding their young in nests in the pyracantha on the back wall of the house. That was the shady side of course! The birds knew it was going to be hot! We watched them bringing thousands of worms etc. and then the young flew out and away.

Another bird story. It is easy to see when the Spotted Flycatcher arrives from Africa because of the antics it carries out to catch the flies. I have kept a record for the last four years and the dates are as follows:

1991 May 21st  
1992 May 15th  
1993 May 17th  
1994 May 22nd

I think it is unbelievable that it can come those thousands of miles and get here in the same week. The nest this year is on the front of the house and the five young are just about ready to fly.

We watch them for hours doing their aerobatics catching the flies. Last night a young blackbird came and sat on their favourite perch just in front of the nest. They both dive bombed it and gave it a sharp peck as they went by. The young blackbird could not stand it for long and pushed off at speed.

Continuing these notes on Sunday 10th July, I have to report that the young flycatchers have all left the nest and the parents are feeding them in the apple trees at the back and various other places.

year?' There are very few about but there are plenty of swifts. I hope it has nothing to do with air pollution! The birds have found a cleaner country. I can hear you saying 'Rubbish'.

Mrs Leadley told me that one day in her garden she saw a thrush banging a snail on the ground and it had four young ones around watching how to do it. There are thousands of snails about this year. I hope the old thrushes keep up the good work.

Nice to hear the kingfisher is back in the village. I think it might have left to hatch out its young. I do hope it was successful. Better than the little kingfishers we saw dead in their nest when the television put on a programme about nesting birds.

One last point. Have you ever seen more beautiful hanging baskets than we have about this year? That's warmth, plenty of drink and pride in the garden!

### **The Dr. Dutta and Partners – Patient Participation Group**

One of the aims of the P.P.G. is to receive suggestions and constructive criticism, another aim is to maintain and improve the quality of service provided. Hopefully both of these aims have been honoured in recent developments to improve the cover provided during holiday periods. Following a concern voiced to the P.P.G. we asked for some thought to be given to the problem. The situation has been closely looked at by the Doctors and an extra office worker will now help to keep things running smoothly during holiday periods. In order to ensure adequate cover when one or more of the Doctors is on holiday (or even off sick – it does happen!!!), a rolling programme of regular locum cover was being arranged. This is an expensive item but will improve existing cover. With Doctors now regularly coming for periods of G.P. training, this means that there is always an extra, fully qualified doctor known to the Practice who is able to take some of the load.

A third aim of the group is to provide a forum for discussion of topics of general health interest. We are presently looking into the possibility of holding an evening on drug abuse to appeal particularly to teenagers and their parents.

The Pharmacist has lodged an appeal against the F.H.S.A. decision to turn down his application for a licence in Bugbrooke. This matter could take some considerable time to be resolved.

Since my retirement some three years ago, I have witnessed how the safety factor for both pedestrians and drivers of motor vehicles has steadily eroded. Pedestrians taking their lives in their hands, with a particular reference to senior citizens and children.

Many drivers when negotiating intersections, threatened by less thoughtful drivers or poor visibility, proceed: to coin a wartime phrase "With a wing and a prayer".

Personally, I have witnessed on two occasions where but for a miracle, there was every chance of two senior citizens being injured or even killed, I have also been told of similar incidents involving pedestrians.

The official consensus appears to be that although accidents have occurred at various points in the village, as no one has been mortally injured, this somehow adds retarding points to the road safety league table.

Some years ago, following a very unpleasant experience endured by a member of my family, I was prompted to communicate with the then Parish Council to request they consider the subject of vehicular control, believe it or not, the solution to that incident is only now: hopefully! being resolved.

Since that time I have campaigned as a private individual, with the encouragement of other residents, concerned about their children's safety, to ask those in authority to try to improve the factor of road safety in Bugbrooke.

We lesser mortals are well aware that the wheels of bureaucracy revolve slowly, sometimes we even get the impression they stop. With this adage in mind, in January of this year I initiated a private dialogue with the Northamptonshire County Council, Northamptonshire Police and South Northamptonshire Council.

Considering the approach was from a private source, the attitude of the three Authorities was most encouraging, courteous, helpful and understanding, I was agreeably surprised and impressed at the trouble they went to, to consider the points of safety discussed.

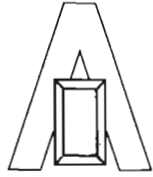

## The Bugbrooke Experience

Following the 'Letter from Australia' (June issue), the Causebrook's exchange family, the Fletchers, now write:

Life in Bugbrooke is certainly different for us from living in Spotswood which is just minutes from the centre of Melbourne. We are not accustomed to milk being delivered in bottles 6 days of the week, or videos being driven right to our door and Chinese food cooked while you wait, just metres away from the house 4 nights a week. You don't even have to walk out to your front gate to collect the post (that is, if it is delivered) as there is no such thing as a mail box in Bugbrooke. The occasional sounds of the rooster crowing, the doves cooing and the horse next door neighing are far more pleasant to the ears than the roar of the semi-trailers and screeching brakes of the petrol tankers that we are used to hearing back home.

England is not at all like I imagined. We excitedly planned our trips for at least 18 months before we left and studied our maps for hours on

end with our 'Frommers' travel book to guide us. Comparing this island with Australia and considering the distances we are used to travelling, we thought in a month or so we will have seen all of Great Britain. One of our first trips was to visit London, one look at the map was to gaze in wonder at what looked to us like a pile of spaghetti. In Australia, a roundabout is used to slow traffic down at an intersection and an intersection means the crossing of *two* roads. We quickly learnt that if you don't spot your destination the first time round, just keep circling until you do. I have never seen so many roads meet at the one point or actually go in layers crossing over the top of each other.

We also imagined that with over 50 million people living here that not one patch of grass would be left and that every square inch would be built on. You cannot imagine our astonishment at mile after mile of beautiful rich green countryside dotted with picturesque villages with their thatched roof cottages. We decided that there are really only about 3 million people in England and most of those are either at Sainsburys on Friday night or at Alton Towers waiting in the 2 hour queue for Nemesis.

Wales and England are absolutely beautiful countries. Many people have often asked us what we miss about home. Except for family and friends, the truth is, we are having such a wonderful time there isn't anything that we have really missed. There was a period of time however, when it was so cold I couldn't bare to get out of the car for more than 5 minutes and I certainly thought of the summer we had left behind.

There are so many places of historical interest to visit. I clearly remember the splendid vision of our first castle 'Kenilworth Castle'. When I excitedly told my form group of our visit they were concerned that we didn't realise that it was 'just an old ruin'. For the next few weeks they provided me with the brochures and suggestions to see castles that were not falling down such as Warwick and Windsor.

My father is making a journal from my letters of our travels and adventures 'for my grandchildren'. We have learnt and experienced so much in the last 6 months. We saw snow falling for the first time in Bath. Passers by looked at these 3 mad Australians excitedly running about late at night trying to catch snowflakes. I will never forget walking into Everdon woods and seeing the carpet of bluebells sprinkled with clusters of white flowers as though it had been perfectly designed by a landscape gardener. I wrote home that I had been to heaven. We may speak the same language, theoretically speaking that is, but we are definitely from a different culture, which has made it all the more enjoyable for us.

Steve and I have both enjoyed teaching at Campion. The two schools, Westbourne and Campion, and our Education systems are very different but you don't travel half way around the world to experience more of the same. One of the hardest things about teaching here will be to say good-bye to the friends we have made on the staff and in the community, my form group and many of the students I teach. We are definitely coming back, my next long service leave is actually only 6 years away. *Sandy Fletcher*

### Picnic treat – Rice Salad

This recipe was received from a link reader, she suggests that it would go down well at a picnic. (To feed a lot of people, adjust if need be)

12oz long-grain rice	2oz whole almonds
1 or 2 spring onions	French dressing
½lb (or a pack) mange-tout peas.	Mint

## Royal British Legion

The 50th Anniversary of D Day is now gone. Watching the events brought a feeling of pride in the achievement of the Allied Forces in the face of such great difficulty on that day. It is of interest that among the notables attending the ceremony The Queen served as a subaltern in the Auxiliary Territorial Service; Prince Philip as a Greek citizen was a lieutenant in the Royal Navy; Monsieur Mitterand, the French President, was in the Maquis and Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands served in the Free Dutch Forces at the time. Perhaps the worst recollection was of the enormous number of casualties suffered on the American beach-head landing. The lasting memory of the anniversary was of Her Majesty walking along the line of the disabled ex-Servicemen and women in their wheel chairs and talking to each one.

I attended a Junior Leaders' Course at the School of Infantry in Sennelager shortly after the war. I went back to that place in 1977 and witnessed the unique sight of a whole Division of the British Army on parade complete with tanks, guns and aircraft. A similar unique event occurred last June, when the Colours of every British Regiment were paraded before Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother for a ceremony which passed without hardly being noticed. This was for the 50th Anniversary of the Army Benevolent Fund. Today the Fund derives its income from public donation and from each soldier contributing one day's pay each year. At the beginning, I recall, we were paid a weekly allowance to cover the cost of buying our blanco, brass polish and boot polish in the NAAFI, but we never received this money because it was paid as a 'voluntary' contribution to the Fund. This is not quite the same as the money paid by the UN to the various nations with troops in Bosnia. Most countries pass this money to their troops as a form of danger money, but it seems the British government is holding it in its

own coffers. It might even be used to pay the large sums awarded to pregnant ex-Servicewomen. It is highly unlikely that it will be used to increase the War Widows Pension.

In the Great War, zeppelins and aeroplanes of the German air arm bombed places in Yorkshire, East Anglia, London and Kent causing many casualties and much damage. There was little chance of German towns being bombed in retaliation. So they had no idea of how horrifying such a type of warfare can be for a civilian population. The same situation prevailed in the early days of the Second World War until the RAF had recovered from the defence cuts of the 1920s. The survivors of Rotterdam and Coventry, among other places, were therefore only too pleased that the RAF was able to give the Germans a taste of their own medicine from 1942 onwards. The person with the task of dishing out these attacks was Marshal of the RAF Sir Arthur Harris. The whole nation applauded the Bomber Command successes but recent writers have denigrated the memory of this fine officer and his brave crews. The Canadians are making a biographical film of him but, far from being welcome, it gives cause for concern. Those under 50 years of age not having experience of such things will probably accept it at face value despite its failings. What a pity that the law of slander is only applied to living people.

## Betty's Pantry

### Turkey Breast with Mushroom Sauce

12oz Raw turkey breast, skinned & boned  
½ pint Chicken stock made from 1 chicken stock cube  
2oz Onion, chopped  
4oz Mushrooms, sliced  
½oz Low-fat spread or butter  
1 tbs Flour  
Salt & pepper  
Milk

Place the turkey breast in a small saucepan with the stock, onion and mushrooms. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer gently for 30 minutes. Remove the turkey and mushrooms and keep warm. Drain the stock into a measuring jug and make up to ½ pint with milk. Pour into a saucepan and add the low-fat spread/butter, flour. Bring to the boil, whisking all the time and cook for 2-3 minutes. Season to taste and stir in the mushrooms. Pour over the Turkey breast and serve with peas, carrots and new potatoes. Serves 2.

4 tbs Dry sherry

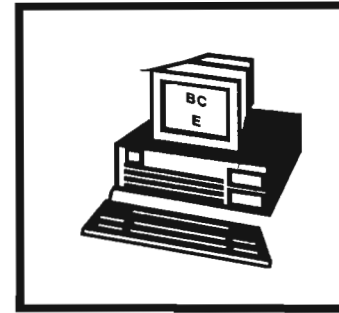
Whisk all together. Place in tall glasses and chill overnight.

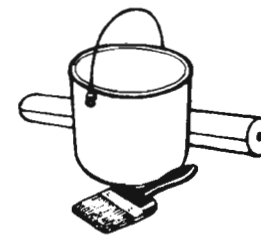
