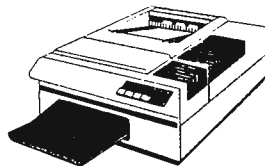
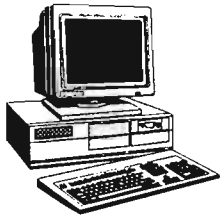

If the Village wants a magazine it must support it, it must by and large supply the information for insertion – and regularly – and on time.

It could soon be too late for those generously thinking residents who talk of a “small dedicated band” who keep the LINK going. If keeping it going becomes a chore, it will also become a bore and we all have other things we could do.

Parish Council – November and December 1993

The County Council's Highways Area Manager may be persuaded to meet the cost of providing new village signs (perhaps with the rather optimistic request “please drive carefully”) and replacement Notice Boards. These Notice Boards contain not only details of Parish Council meetings but also interesting items like changes in refuse collection arrangements (how many were caught out again over the Christmas holidays?!) and revised bus timetables. All parishioners should glance occasionally at these Boards. Whilst on the topic of Notice Boards, could I put in a plea to anyone using the Boards to advertise local events – please do not use the space reserved for Parish Council notices, do not staple notices to the Boards and don't forget to remove them after the event has taken place. Otherwise such notices are welcomed.

The Police are attempting another crime prevention evening in the village despite the poor turnout at the last event held in November. In order to ensure that everyone is aware of this meeting each house should receive a leaflet giving details of the date, time and place. They may even use the Notice Boards!

South Northamptonshire Council have re-surfaced the footpath between Chipsey Avenue and Kislingbury Road and so it is now possible to walk down this path without risk to life and limb. They also propose to close the unofficial path between the garages at Butts Hill Crescent at the rear of Smitherway. Although this may cause some slight inconvenience to some residents at the school end of Smitherway, the closure of this path should significantly reduce the scope for vandalism and various other nefarious activities. balance, therefore, the Parish Council welcomed this proposal. Discussions are continuing as to where to re-locate the existing street light. The most likely location seems to be towards the school gate although a planned site inspection might produce a more favourable spot.

The Bus Company recently have seemed determined to confuse us. First, having had numerous unsightly poles removed from the High Street as the street lighting cables went underground, the Bus Company seem eager to erect a pole to replace the "lost" bus stop sign. The Parish Council are hoping that a more aesthetic means of supporting a sign can be found. Second, their changes to the bus timetables include the phrase – the Harpole to Northampton bus will now go from Flore – surely this makes it the Flore to Northampton bus?!

An officer of South Northamptonshire Council attended the meeting in December and informed the Parish Council that local byelaws for the control of dogs should be introduced by September 1994. Members were a little confused as laws regarding such controls already exist. However, as there is only one Dog Warden patrolling the whole of the South Northamptonshire Council area, the effectiveness of local or national laws will depend, as ever, on the good sense and social conscience of dog owners who must all be aware that it is illegal and anti-social to allow dogs to roam loose and to foul footways.

The affordable housing survey produced a response of 115 forms returned and these are now being assessed by the Rural Housing Association. The Parish Council were not particularly happy with the design of the form. A small committee comprising John Curtis, Canon Tim Partridge, Mrs Kathleen Riggall and myself spent many hours re-designing and testing a more suitable form as we believed that the one produced by South Northamptonshire Council could be misleading. Unfortunately, South Northamptonshire Council did not accept our form on the grounds that the Housing Association were practised in assessing only theirs. The results of this survey are still awaited.

It was slightly irritating to read in the local newspaper how efficient the Highway Authority had been in putting into place

the new gritting arrangements just before the first severe weather of the winter. In reality they had written to parish council clerks only two days before the bad weather telling them that the necessary rock salt would be less freely available than in the past. Bearing in mind that most parish councils meet monthly and that the law requires that at least three clear days notice is given of a meeting, the truth is that villages throughout the County were caught out by the weather and some essential local routes were left in a treacherous and almost impassable condition for two to three days. Ever optimistic, however, the Parish Council have asked for existing grit bins to be replenished and even for an additional grit bin, as well as for an extension to the existing gritting route to cover the "spine roads" of John's Road, Oaklands, Meadway and Pilgrims Lane to the junction of Camp Hill. Such requests are worth making but often represent the triumph of hope over experience.

How should we pay for our water?

In days of yore water was a national asset and we paid for it by reference to the rateable value of our property. We still do so after privatisation but this must end by the end of the century. It is arguable whether privatisation has benefited the consumer (though it is not arguable whether it has benefited the bosses), but do you realise how your bills have increased year by year since the Tories won the 1979 General Election?

If the rateable value of your house is £326 (an arbitrary figure chosen because in 1980-81 your water bill would have been £100) the remorseless rise would have been to the nearest £1, as follows:-

1981-82: £111	1988-89: £189
1982-83: £122	1989-90: £212
1983-84: £127	1990-91: £242

Anglian Water are forecasting that by the year 2000 their charge for such a house will have gone up from £343 to at least £583.

All the various water authorities are considering what to do about charging when they can no longer use the defunct rateable value, and so far Anglian is the only one to have made up its mind to introduce universal metering; whereas three (Northumbrian, North West and Welsh) have decided against metering.

Over the last three years there has been a monitoring of metering over 60,000 houses spread over twelve areas, most of them (50,000) in the Isle of Wight, where consumption fell by 21%, but only by 11% in the other areas.

Who will benefit from metering? Certainly a small family in a large house, but certainly not a large family in a small house. Just like the unlamented Poll Tax.

It has been estimated that actual consumption only accounts for 10% of the system's running costs, and that up to a third of the water pumped through the supply pipes is lost through leakage. So would it not be better to concentrate on leak detection and repair rather than dig up every village path to install meters which will have to be read on a regular basis? Except for makers of meters of course! There are many families in the Isle of Wight who claim that metering has doubled their bills! We are not surprised. We shall see the same thing happening in the Anglian area if their universal metering idea is actually implemented. As rateable value is out of bounds, why not substitute the current A-H Council Tax charging bands?

The Director General of Water Services is the head of an independent Office of Water Services (OFWAT) set up by the Government to protect the consumer's interests. The local office is at Carlyle House, Carlyle Road, Cambridge CB4 0DU. OFWAT has invited your views on future water bills, so write and have a say in how you pay.

Nature Notes by Bill Lantsbery



Starting to write these notes on 6th January, I have never looked out on a more depressing morning. There is a thin covering of snow over everything, the ground is sodden and the sky is very grey. Yesterday morning there had been so much rain that I had a stream running across the top of the garden. December was supposed to be one of the wettest months since goodness knows when. Many people were dreadfully flooded. Roll on Spring.

Having started with a major grumble let me find one ray of sunshine. In the garden little green leaves are peeping through the snow. The daffodils are making a start! Another pleasant sight in these grey days are the two bushes that are on flower – the Jasmin and the Viburnum.

The bird table is a popular spot in these cold conditions. The Tits are giving the nuts what for! I thought I saw a small Tit with a completely black head. I wondered whether it was a Willow Tit? Chatting to Dean Manning one day, while he was working on the stone house opposite the Post Office, he said he had seen a Tawny Owl somewhere near Fawsley. That is good news, I would love to hear an owl towhit-towho again!

the egg over to the male to look after was wonderful. The pictures of the krill being eaten, the penguins shuffling off for hundreds of miles and then a photograph of 600,000 of them huddling together to try and keep warm. Yes, this series was a winner. I have seen two very good articles in the papers during the week. One was about Holland. In that country all hunting is banned, so is all lead shot! This means that foxes can increase and some birds like lapwings and curlews and many ground nesting birds have all been eaten.

The other article was only this morning, 8th January. It was asking 'Why are there so few thrushes?' It put that down to most of us putting down too many slug pellets! Why do we not hear the skylark now? It is thought modern farming methods were taking away the food for many birds. Stubble ploughed up and another crop planted so quickly might take food for the birds away.

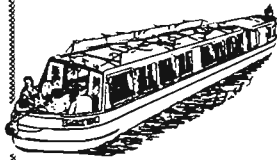

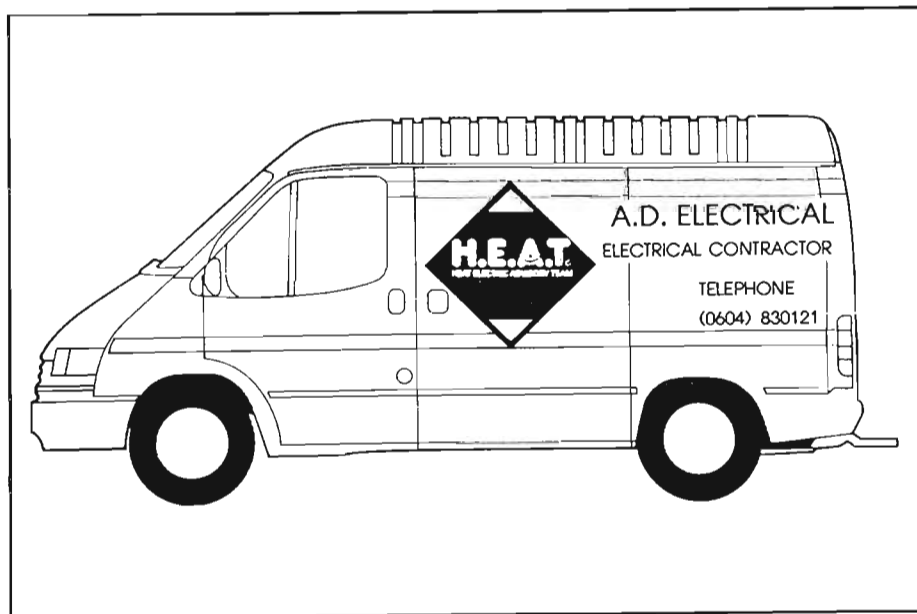

in August 1914. At the end of that war, the survivors were told
that they had fought the war to end all wars. To ensure a
lasting peace, there was the League of Nations. On the strength
of this, our government disarmed us to the level where it took
us a couple of years of struggle in the 1940s whilst we
re-armed in the Second World War. Our casualty rate was
almost as terrible as that of the trench warfare of twenty years
before.

Since the end of the Second World War, our government has committed our Armed Forces to maintain or regain peace in Palestine, Cyprus, Kenya, Malaya, Korea, Northern Ireland, the Falklands and now Bosnia. Much of this fighting has been done on behalf of the United Nations which had replaced the old League of Nations. Among our Branch members, we have some who can tell harrowing tales of their experiences in these 'brush-fire' wars.

With the dismantling of the walls dividing Germany and Berlin, there has again been a euphoric race to reduce our Armed Forces along with the cancellation of orders for much needed modern equipment. We sent our troops to France in 1939 (and later to Arnhem in 1944) with useless radio sets. We sent our troops to the Falklands with inadequate footwear and poorly armoured warships. Now our troops are struggling to keep warm in their inadequate clothing in Bosnia.

Cutting back on the Nation's defences is a false economy tantamount to ending the payments for the household insurance. We now see what had been feared showing its ugly face in Russia with a resurgence of the old regime. The intransigence of the United Nations has done nothing to end the fighting in Bosnia with the threat of another flare up in Macedonia in the offing. It is to be hoped that we will not be involved in another Boer war.

We cannot reduce our Armed Forces and at the same time expect them to undertake commitments all over the globe. We can only hope that the various warring factions will come to their senses and that our troops can be withdrawn. Let us all hope and pray for a Happy and Peaceful world in 1994.

Betty's Pantry

South Sea Island Pork (serves 4)

1lb Shoulder Pork	½ pint Stock
½ lb Collar Bacon	4 ozs Frozen Peas
½ oz Seasoned Flour	¼ pint Double Cream
½ oz Lard	1 oz Blanched Almonds
1 tbs Oil	shredded
Rind of 1 Orange cut in thin strips	Chopped parsley
Juice of 1 orange	

Cut meat in cubes, toss in flour. Heat lard & oil, fry meat until sealed. Place in casserole with rind, juice & stock. Cover & cook for 1 hour (Gas Mark 4). Check seasoning. Add peas & cook for further ½ hour. Add cream & almonds. Return to oven for 5 minutes to heat through.

Serve and sprinkle with parsley.

This dish can be cooked up to the addition of peas, fridge overnight, then cook as from addition of peas.

Vegetables cooked in homely manner

2 lb Potatoes peeled	1 lb Carrots diced
4 ozs Cheddar cheese	1 small cauliflower in florets
1 onion peeled	½ lb Mushrooms sliced
2 tbs oil + 2 tbs oil	2 tsp Fresh Parsley or
Salt & freshly ground Pepper	Rosemary
3 Leeks washed & finely chopped	

For the topping
4 ozs Cheese

1 tbs fresh Parsley finely chopped

Pre-heat oven to Gas Mark 4.

Grate the raw potatoes, cheese & ½ onion by hand or processor. Mix in 2 tbs of oil & season well. Press this mixture into a 9 inch pie-dish, building up sides to form a shell.

Bake in oven for 45 minutes until the crust is just beginning to brown.

Meanwhile prepare vegetables. Heat 2 tbs of oil, fry remaining chopped onion, leeks, carrots & cauliflower florets slowly for 5-10 minutes turning over in pan. Then add mushrooms & continue cooking all vegetables for another 5 minutes with pan covered. Add herbs, salt & freshly ground black pepper. Next pile all vegetables into crust & sprinkle 4 ozs cheese mixed with 1 tbs chopped parsley over the top. Bake for 20 minutes until the edges of the shell look crisp and cheese has melted. Serve hot.

Can be adapted to vegetables in season.

An Indian Experience

An experience certainly sums up our recent tour of Northern India. We found a land of sharp contrasts and enormous diversity and learnt very quickly not to attach Western values to everything we observed.

We arrived at New Delhi just after midnight. Two hours later, we emerged through immigration and customs to find ourselves in the midst of potential guides and taxi drivers eager to be of service. We eventually found 'our man', who told us to stay put whilst he organised the taxi. Outside the airport was the first real assault on the senses. People were squatting beside stoves cooking spicy concoctions, some were sleeping peacefully among all the noise and activity. Taxis and auto-rickshaws were vying for position at the entrance of the

airport. Our taxi appeared, one of the many Morris Oxfords that seem to be in proliferation there. On the journey to the hotel, the car fired constantly on only three cylinders (we found later, most of them did) but it did not seem to worry the driver unduly.

We arrived at the hotel, a shining white edifice towering above a mixture of office buildings and shanties. We were greeted by two impressive guards, resplendent in their white uniforms and huge scarlet turbans. We were guided into the vestibule with its seven stored atrium with white marble pillars and cascading waterfall covering one wall. This was the other India of total opulence and luxury enjoyed by only a privileged few of the population.

The next day was to be our first real taste of India. We were to tour Old and New Delhi. We were driven by coach through the narrow streets of Old Delhi into the teeming activity of the Chandni Chowk. Our coach stopped for a moment beside a truck that was unloading live chickens. These were passed from the crates to someone who immediately beheaded them with a machete!

We eventually reached the magnificent Jama Masjid Mosque (the largest mosque in India), which presides grandly over Old Delhi. We had been warned that we would be approached by beggars and hawkers. Our guide said although it was entirely up to us whether we gave or not, they did not wish to encourage begging. He said it was not necessary, the government would take care of them if they so wished, but they did not choose to have their freedom curtailed. It was however, difficult to avert the eyes from such abject poverty and hideous deformities that were so apparent and concentrate on the splendour of the mosque.

We should have had a tour of the Red Fort later that day, but found it closed for security reasons, due to some religious restlessness which became noticeable by the large numbers of armed troops that were in the area. We did however, on return from our tour of Rajasthan, manage to see a 'Son et Lumiere' performance within the Red Fort. This depicted the history of Delhi from the Moghul era up to the Independence in 1947.

We then drove back to New Delhi. This was designed by Sir Edward Lutyens and is an impressive reminder of British Imperial rule, with its wide tree lined avenues, a stark contrast to the conglomeration of the bustling streets that is Old Delhi.

The next day we left for Samode, where we were to stay in what had been a Maharajah's palace. We drove along the main road out of Delhi behind camel carts and what looked like a whole school class on a bullock cart. People were bulging out of buses and perching on the luggage rack on the roof.

It was as though we had stepped back in time. The oxen were pulling the ploughs and women in brightly coloured saris were working in the fields, some walked gracefully by the side of the road, balancing baskets of produce on their heads and holding their veils across their faces with their teeth.

We eventually reached the palace, a haven of peace and tranquility, where we could walk undisturbed within its walled gardens and courtyards – until you stepped outside the palace gates of course! In the afternoon we 'enjoyed' a ride in a camel cart around the village adjoining the palace, where the dwelling accommodation was in stark contrast. Later that evening a banquet was prepared for us in the Great Hall. We were seated cross legged on cushions as the food was served to us in the traditional style. This became extremely uncomfortable after several minutes and we became acutely aware our western limbs were not accustomed to this position!

After Samode we stayed at Jaipur which was known as the pink city because it is built of pink sandstone. Our guide took us on a tour of the city by foot. Our 'crocodile' was observed with much interest; young boys would inquire of our nationality in French, German and English. We soon found out that the cows we saw walking nonchalantly down the main street have the right of way everywhere! We were told that every Hindu family was required by their religion to keep a cow. This understandably becomes quite difficult in the towns and cities as far as grazing is concerned, but because of their sacred status they are given food daily. Hindus believe they will gain a blessing from their gods for feeding them.

A few miles from Jaipur is the deserted city of Amber and

the Amber Fort, once the ancient capital of the Rajput Empire. We made the steep ascent to the fort by riding on an elephant. This was rather like being in a boat in a heavy swell. It was also rather precarious, with just a flimsy metal bar between us and a drop of several hundred feet on one side. We were carried through the Sun Gate to a pretty garden courtyard swarming with langur monkeys. Once in the fort we had a magnificent view of the classical Rajasthani landscape, parched hills, surrounding a lake where water buffalo were dozing in the sun and vultures sat in watchful anticipation in nearby trees.

On the way to Agra, we visited the deserted city of Fatehpur Sikri. This was constructed by Akbar in 1569. It is still in a remarkable state of preservation. Akbar's Court occupied the city until it was abandoned after only 17 years, due to lack of water.

At almost every stop snake charmers would appear, take a basket from the canvas bag they carried, squat down and quickly try to charm the snake into action before the party moved on. We also saw the dancing bears. These were pathetic creatures with their teeth and claws removed who were cruelly jerked into performing by their gypsy owners.

At last we reached Agra and the Taj Mahal. One of the seven wonders of the world. However much you are prepared for its splendour, the first sight is still breathtaking. The shimmering white marble monument dominates the skyline. We stayed until sunset to watch the colour change from white to gold. Unfortunately we could not stay until dawn to watch it change to rose pink, as it was time to move on. Our tour was drawing to a close, we found it exhausting, exhilarating and delightful. This taste of India whetted our appetite for venturing further into the sub-continent; after a suitable period of recuperation of course!

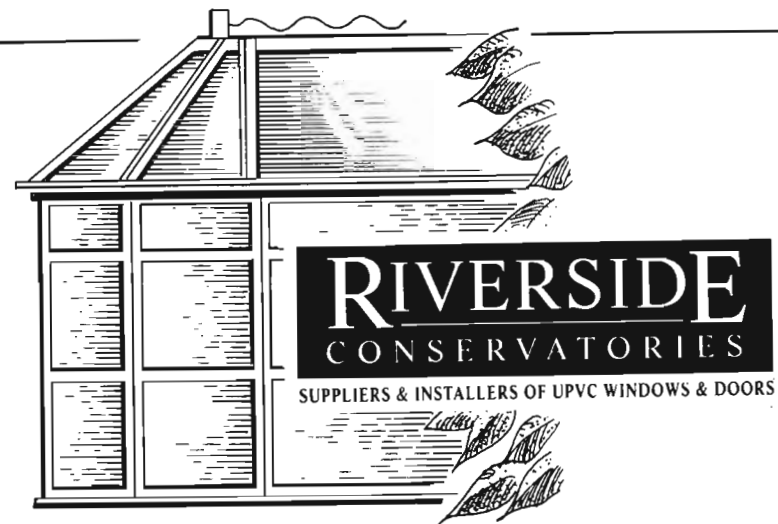
Bugbrooke Playing Fields Association

1994 promises to be a very important year for Bugbrooke, especially in terms of community facilities. The Community Hall and Bowls Green now have the backing of the Parish Council and the District Councils with the latter committed to £60,000 to £70,000 of works towards the Community Hall. We are awaiting the decisions from the County Council and Foundation for the Sports and Arts concerning our requests to them.

As an initial contribution, the South Northants Councils Technical Services department have drawn up some provisional plans which give a good idea of what accommodation could be constructed. Principally this involves a large hall, (16m x 12m) a small hall, (10m x 8m) a lounge (10m x 8m) and Changing Rooms. 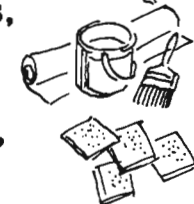

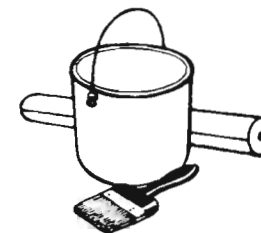
