Parish Council meetings – January and February 1995

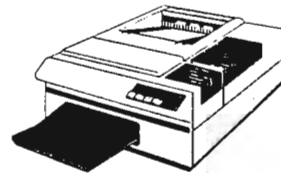
The January meeting incorporated the County Council's Meet the People Tour and was attended by a Senior County Councillor, a Chief Officer and other high ranking officers of the County Council. The Parish Council and members of the public took the opportunity to raise a number of issues relating to County Council services. Most questions concerned the Highways Department and the County Council representatives undertook, amongst other things, to further investigate traffic calming measures, to review the volume of lorry movements through the village with particular regard to weight restrictions and to look again at the possibility of providing an access direct from Heygates Mill to the A45/M1 roundabout. Another important and positive development following this meeting is the likelihood of some form of library provision at the proposed Community Centre. This could involve the installation of computer terminals containing information about book stocks and a "distance learning" facility. The provision of a community centre would also permit some form of semi-permanent library, probably in the car park area.

A further County Council undertaking is for a drop kerbing scheme in the High Street to provide additional crossings for disabled people and prams/pushchairs. The intention is to re-shape some crossings, put in new sections of drop kerbs, remove broken slabs and slightly widen some parts of the pavement. This work to take place before the end of March. The County Council have already agreed to the provision of a suitable footpath at Peace Hill. This work will be carried out in the next financial year, beginning in April 1995.

Continuing the highways theme and the positive approach – after numerous meetings, letters and discussions the County Council have agreed to clear the obstruction in the sewer at The Paddocks and to repair the damage caused by the willow tree roots. They cannot, however, accept responsibility for what is yet another unadopted sewer in the village which thus remains the responsibility of the residents. If the problem re-occurs more drastic measures addressing the cause of the problems may be required.

At the request of the Parish Council the developer of the site off Camp Hill has agreed to amend the plan to include three smaller two bedroomed houses. Developers are reluctant to include these small starter homes in their schemes as they make less money. Nonetheless, the Parish Council have (with one notable exception at what is now Badgers Close) been fairly successful in persuading developers to make some provision for young couples from the village. An opportunity to provide small bungalows suitable for retired people appears to have

been thwarted by South Northamptonshire Council. An application from the Playing Fields Association for planning permission for two small bungalows on the existing car park site at the top of Pilgrims Lane has been unaccountably refused by the District Council. This was apparently not a unanimous decision and will be pursued further as it contradicts the District Council's alleged support for the Parish Council's policy of providing suitable homes for the young and the old. Pilgrims Lane already has a variety of properties on front and back locations and two small bungalows at the top of the road would not be incompatible.

The Parish Council did support South Northamptonshire Council planners on another issue. They are minded to oppose changes in the Local Plan suggested by landowners to allow pockets of land in Bugbrooke to be given planning permission for residential or commercial development. In one instance the word pocket is inappropriate as it could be considered a large tract of land, the development of which would undoubtedly change the character of the village.

Parish Councillors were at first puzzled by an item on the agenda regarding "safety chains for OAPs". This seemed excessively harsh! It was explained, however, that the chains were for the front doors and the item referred to the concerns of the Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator, Mr Wyles, that South Northamptonshire Council were not providing these in all their bungalows. The Parish Council, supported by the Police, quickly agreed to ask them to reconsider.

Perhaps with an element of self interest the Parish Council agreed to purchase 14 new chairs for the Village Hall. This might be a mixed blessing as meetings could take longer in the future if members are more comfortable.

East Midlands Electricity seemed to have gone into hibernation during the early weeks of 1995. Despite several reminders no progress was made in various street lighting projects. This inactivity did not seem to have spread to their invoicing department (which, of course, is quite separate from the department which erects the poles and lamps, which is itself quite separate from the department which supplies the electricity to said poles and lamps) as bills were received for work which had not been completed. A stiff letter despatched in early March resulted in a flurry of activity and new lamps which had stood forlornly in the dark for many weeks at Chipsey Avenue and the Levitts Road footpath were duly connected.

Finally, Parish Council and District Council elections will take place on Thursday the 4th May. Anyone interested in standing for election to the Parish Council should complete and return the nomination form to South Northamptonshire Council between 27th March and 12 noon on the 4th April.

Then it will be much easier to persuade South Northants Council that Bugbrooke ought to be the next village to be considered for housing improvements for both the elderly and young families.

Please help to give Bugbrooke every chance to improve the housing available to its residents by completing and returning the questionnaire. We can then try to ensure that future generations of Bugbrooke folk can get the benefit of improved care and housing facilities within our own community.

Nature Notes by Bill Lantsbery

Well I think I will have to start these notes by writing something about the weather. We have actually had some snow and the children have been able to build some snowmen. Looking down the garden I can see that little heaps have not disappeared. The old saying was that it might be waiting for some more - I wonder. The rainfall to-day 7th March, has been very heavy. The way water is running out of several fields amazes me. There will certainly be no hosepipe ban.

We have had a very interesting bird coming to the bird table. It was a Siskin. I have never seen one before. It is about the size of a bluetit, something like a small hedge sparrow but it has yellow markings on its wings and a nice forked tail. It is rather shy, it does not stay very long and goes into the yellow conifer to look for food.

The other birds that I am seeing so much of now are robins. There is no quarrelling now. They feed together on the table, in fact I think if they could, they would be holding hands! I put a handful of porridge oats out every morning and they peck away till every bit has gone. They will soon be looking for a nesting site.

Another bird I must mention is the rook. In one of the previous set of notes I wrote that a pair of rooks came back all the way through the winter and fussed about in their old nest from last year. There was just that one nest left in the tree. Well one of the dreadful gusts of wind that we had some weeks ago, turned the nest onto its side. They tried for

days to do something about it, and then they made up their minds and moved quite a lot of the old sticks to a lower fork in the tree. They fetched hundreds of new pieces and now we have a new large nest weathering every storm. I think she may soon be laying. Another pair have started one close by and I am praying the winds will fail to move it.

On several occasions a mistle thrush has sat on the same branch in the hedge behind the Five Bells and sang its head off! I see in the bird book it is noted for singing even in a winter gale. I am so pleased when I hear a thrush singing. There have been several programmes on the television about certain species of birds disappearing due to something or other. I saw one about that lovely bird the bittern losing its breeding environment in the fens and marshes. The skylark of course has lessened in numbers. Having said that I am sure some birds are more numerous – the blackbird, the collared dove, the great tit, those are just three that are doing well.

There is one animal that must be getting more numerous and that is the fox. So many people have seen me and told me that they have seen one trotting about in the middle of the day. They seem to be getting quite tame. I don't see so many rabbits about in the field behind us. Are the foxes living on rabbit? What a pity foxes don't like moles! There are more molehills about this year than I have ever seen. We shall have to go back to employing a "molecatcher".

I thought I saw a good programme one night about a lady named Eunice Overend. She had the title of Britain's Badger Woman. She was making every effort to see that badgers are not slaughtered unnecessarily. I think the car is going to keep the numbers down quite easily!

I feel very sorry that the daffodils opposite home, beside the church car park took such a hammering from the snow on March 3rd. They will never pick up. Hard luck Tim! Many other buds are swelling on shrubs and trees and in just over a fortnight we shall come to Summer time. What a pleasant thought. I think we have had more than our share of bitter winds and heavy rain.

I hope all you animal lovers are watching Rolf Harris on the Animal Hospital programme. I think it is first class.

The development of the Ironworks at Heyford and Stowe and with associated railway sidings probably led to the new employment of 32 ironstone workers and 33 railway workers from the village in 1881. Did this bring new prosperity and as a result the number of Dressmakers rose from 4 to 12. The 1851 census recorded 58 Lacemakers some as young as 6 years old but 30 years later only 1 was shown.

From all of this information I am trying to find out where the farms were situated and the location of shops and main areas of habitation during this period.

Could this, subject to interest from others, eventually lead to the production of a village historical walk leaflet.

Taken from Mrs Linley Sambourne's note book

Entire charge of morning room, dining room and pantry. Assist once a week in thoroughly cleaning dining room.

- 7am Down by 7 am, thoroughly dust, sweep and shake rugs, clean brasses in dining room, wipe over windows inside – lay breakfast
- 8 am Breakfast in kitchen
- 8.30 am Sweep, dust and polish morning room, water plants – keep brass and silver well polished. All plants and vases watered, dead flowers and leaves removed.
- 9 am Mr Roy's breakfast. Put out Mr Roy's hat, gloves, stick or umbrella. Put Mr Roy's books ready.
- 9.30 am Fetch breakfast tray, put away Mr Roy's clothes and take to brush. See to Mr Roy's silver and his drawers tidy.
- 10 am Wash up breakfast things and see to drawing room silver.
- 11 am Prepare two rooms for special cleaning, after which lay luncheon.
- 1.15 pm Dress for luncheon
- 1.30 pm Lunch. Look through Mr Roy's clothes and keep all mended.
- 4.30 pm Tea.
- 6.30 pm Put out Mr Roy's evening clothes. To have dinner table ready laid for 7 pm.
- 8 pm Dinner

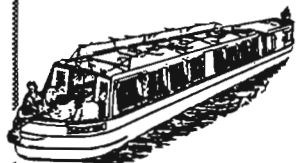

Step into the Past

V.E. Day – Saturday 8th May 1945.

I suppose the day dawned bright and sunny, they usually did at that time of the year in Italy.

I recall being stationed in a small town Capua, situated somewhere between Naples and Rome, as I remember on the banks of the river Volturno.

My temporary abode was in the grounds of a dilapidated castle-like structure, complete with moat (empty), it had been used by the Italians as a munition factory numerous outbuildings had been erected where the moat had been and in the surrounding area, much of it damaged. Those habitable were used as billets.

Several of the buildings still contained decrepit arms making machines, if my memory serves me right several with the name plate B.S.A. (Birmingham Small Arms) quite ironic, we sold the Italians machines to make bullets to shoot us with.

One could walk through buildings ankle deep in empty cartridge cases no doubt waiting to be filled, at the time the town was over run by the allies.

On exploration of the castle one could find in many of the lower rooms, I suppose one could call them dungeons, signs over the doorways, a scull and crossbones and the word periclola (DANGER), a stench of cordite or gunpowder prevailed, these rooms had obviously been used to store explosives.

Many had their sandstone walls blackened where whatever materials they had contained had been ignited, either by the Italians when they evacuated the area or during the allied attack.

I say sandstone, on seeing something there I have never seen before or since, in several of these underground rooms the surface of the walls and ceilings had turned to a glass like texture in browns and greens, I presume due to the intense heat.

I digress.

At that time there were many inspiring words written and spoken about the end of hostilities in Europe.

As I recall the gist was; now the enemy had capitulated, we should all be proud of the part everyone had played in making this a reality, how the nation should rejoice that the war in Europe was over and be grateful at what had been done to protect it from the ravages of the Nazis! How every one should pray for a speedy end to war in the far east, in order that all of us could look forward to a world of peace, prosperity, equality and a better way of life for all.

Everyone in those days knew the price the British nation would have paid had Germany been victorious, how Hitler and the Third Reich's intention was to decimate the British. The Holocaust would have been just a dreadful rehearsal for the main event.

By the grace of God this was not to be! so as you prepare for this 50th anniversary. As you light your beacons. Assemble for your street parties. Let off your fireworks. Spare a thought for those who made it all possible.

For the armed forces of many nations on the land, on the sea and in the air.

For all branches of the home defence forces and the army of the land girls.

For the lads, conscripted and sent to work in the coal mines.

For the women and men, often including semi invalids who toiled long hours in the factories to make not weapons of war, but weapons to win a peace.

For the whole nation who combined to make victory possible and for those who gave their all in so doing.

50 years on I try to remember those noble words, for many they were a prophesy, for thousands, nay million more they have a hollow ring.

True we have enjoyed a semblance of peace and prosperity, in 50 years the world has moved on, we have our TV's, our washing machines, our microwaves, but at a price.

Every day you can read stories of the old, the sick and the defenceless, the also rans.

War Widows, Pensioners and families eking out a frugal existence below or marginally above the poverty line.

The disabled fighting for better recognition.

The ailing National Health Service. Tottering schools.

All struggling to survive, for many, day by day the quality of life eroded, a cut here, a tax there, in 1995 I could fill another page.

Nevertheless there is something to celebrate on this 50th anniversary. Thank God that those of us who are left from that time, our children and our children's children are here, all hopefully looking forward to that brighter horizon.

Enjoy your anniversary celebrations, many fought, worked and died in order that you are here to celebrate.

I was asked the other day what I remembered about VE day, and I couldn't remember a thing. 'Was I drunk all day?', I asked myself, I know we were in the Pub, the Five Bells with our good friends Mr & Mrs Stanton. But then it came back to me, we had my sister-in-law and brother-in-law from Scotland staying with us and Dad decided we must have some flags etc. put up so it fell to Johnny, who was about seventeen at the time, to go up the ladder. Well we girls just fell about laughing as he was wearing a kilt and desperately tried to hide what he had underneath. I think the day didn't stay in my memory as much as the night my Dad (an Air Raid Warden) and I stood on the Wharf Bridge watching Coventry burn, and when he came home with two little waifs from London (evacuees) one of whom became my bridesmaid, and a few years back came to see me. All her family had survived the war.

In Coventry where I lived, it was a day of great thankfulness and relief that the War was finally over after 5 long years. The City was still in

ruins and was many years before things got back to normal, but it was a great day. The government gave us all a days' holiday, from school, and work. Church services were held all over town, indeed, throughout the Country.

Most towns and villages held street parties for everyone, we all put in our meagre rations to help make cakes, sandwiches etc (what of I can't remember as we only had about 2oz fat per week) but we managed somehow, tables were laid end to end, chairs brought out from every home, pianos for music, all in the road or streets. Games were arranged for the younger children, hats brought from somewhere, all the old bunting and flags adorned the roads, songs were sung until we were hoarse! and we danced, with anybody, well into the night.

The official celebrations came later, for most families, when the 'boys' came home, but that one day, was for neighbours and friends, everybody joined in and thanked God at least the fighting was over.

Where were they then....

At least four old veterans living in Bugbrooke remember where they were on VE Day:

Arch Coles was in Italy hoping for a quick release. He said he couldn't give the exact location – for security reasons!

George Staniland was stationed in Egypt. He remembers they had a great celebration on the camp. He particularly remembers it as being the only time in his life that he won a bottle of gin in a raffle.

Harry Clarke – the Legion Secretary – recalls a celebration party for all ranks at RAF Station Skellingthorpe in Lincolnshire.

John Sexton was also in Egypt and accommodated on a house boat on the River Nile on Gezira Island. He swears that the boat containing WAAF personnel was moored on the other side of the river! John confesses to a long drink in Sheppard Hotel.

Royal British Legion

The distorted story of Bomber Command given in a Canadian film has now been redressed by a British production which was recently shown on TV. It is clear from this that MRAF Sir Arthur Harris and his gallant crews were made scapegoats by British politicians when there was an outcry against the bombing of Dresden. The decision to bomb that German town was not taken by the C-in-C of Bomber Command who was acting on a directive handed down to him. Although the American Air Force also took part in these raids, that service has escaped criticism

because of an American government statement made at the time defending their action. No such statement was made by the British Government.

Governments are to-day still responsible for putting young men into similar impossible situations. Our troops are in Bosnia as part of a UN peace-keeping force. How can they keep the peace if they are not allowed to defend themselves and disarm the protagonists? We have had our soldiers patrolling among a civilian population in Northern Ireland where some terrorists are lurking behind the others awaiting an opportunity to place a bomb or commit murder. How can a soldier distinguish such terrorists from peaceful members of the local community?

The government endeavours to shield itself by claiming that the troops are given a card with instructions for their conduct while on patrol and what to do when considering opening fire. All this has to be done in split second. When things go wrong, our politicians fling the young soldier into court to stand trial on a charge of murder. What about those responsible for putting this lad in this predicament? It is no wonder that there is public anguish at the way Private Clegg has been treated. The branch also shares this anguish and at first decided as a mark of support for this young man to boycott the celebrations for Victory in Europe. But then it was realised that this displayed disrespect for the Queen and the branch's decision was rescinded.

Vaccinations

Are you going abroad for your holiday this year? If so do you need any travel jabs? Europe, USA and Australia are considered "clean" countries, so all you need are up to date tetanus and polio (both of which last for 10 years) In fact, everyone should have a tetanus booster every 10 years – we have recently found that we have no record of tetanus on 2000 patients!

If you're going further afield typhoid and hepatitis A protection are advised. Some parts of South America, Africa and Far East require meningitis and yellow fever vaccination – the latter can only be given at a yellow fever centre (our nearest being St Giles Clinic or Towcester Health Centre) Those back-packing or living rough are advised to have rabies protection. As many of these injections can be given simultaneously a visit to your friendly Practice Nurse(!) a month before you travel will give you time.

Malaria is still a major killer in the Third World – did you know that accidents kill more tourists than anything else? – and in some parts of the world the malaria mosquito has become resistant to chloroquine. So you may be given different malaria tablets – you should start taking them a week before travelling and continue for 4 weeks after returning. None of these measures give you 100% protection from disease, so one still needs to drink and eat sensibly.

By the time children leave school they should have been immunised against tetanus, polio, rubella, TB, measles and diphtheria. If they have missed any of these they can be given at the surgery, with the exception of TB (available at NGH chest clinic) and diphtheria, which will not be available until the autumn.

Village Policing

As you may be aware, following recent press releases, Northamptonshire Police have for some months, been engaged in a major review of internal structures and ways of improving service to the public. this will

result in a number of changes being introduced within the force area, on the 1st April 1995.

The borough of Northampton has for many years been split into two police areas, the sub-divisions of Campbell Square and Weston Favell Police Stations. Bugbrooke and a large number of other villages surrounding Northampton, have formed part of the Weston Favell police area, since 1983. As a result of the force review, the two police areas within Northampton will amalgamate on the 1st April, 1995, to become the Northampton area and responsibility for policing the villages, to the north, south and west of Northampton, including Bugbrooke, will be transferred to the Daventry Police area from this date.

Bugbrooke will form part of the Towcester Section of the Daventry area and as your village constable, I will be working from Towcester Police Station, after moving from the Weston Favell Rural South Office, presently located behind Mere Way Police Station, on 1st April 1995.

During the next few weeks, details of the forthcoming changes will be publicised in the local press, including contact telephone numbers, but should you require the assistance of the police prior to the 1st April 1995, please contact Weston Favell Police Station on 01604 700700 or in the case of an emergency 999.

Neighbourhood Watch

It is very pleasing to be able to report that the Police have informed us that the crime figures relating to Bugbrooke for the year 1994 show a reduction of 32% compared with 1993. This is, of course, very good news and we hope that perhaps a measure of this upturn may be attributed to the higher level of activity within the Neighbourhood Watch.

Clearly, there is a danger of becoming complacent when hearing of such good results, we would rather look at matters from the point of view of how much more might have been achieved if there was full coverage of the entire village. In particular, more street contacts would enable us to institute much better communications when we receive warnings from the Police concerning outbreaks of a particular type of crime, and thus possibly forestall the potential criminal.

Thefts of, and from motor vehicles continues to be a major contribution to crime figures, and we would once again advise that where possible, it is best to keep your car in a garage when not in use. If you are not fortunate enough to have the use of a garage, then do not leave valuables in your car, keep it locked at all times, and use a visible security device in addition to any other security system. Alarms, coupled with engine immobilizers are also a good idea.

The Police will shortly be commencing an Anti-Vandalism campaign. We would hope that it will receive your fullest support. If you see anything that you consider to be vandalism being committed, then let the police know. The more reports they receive, the better will they be able to take effective steps to catch the people concerned.

Finally, your co-ordinators attended a meeting of the Darby & Joan Club, at which concerns were expressed about the lack of provision of safety chains on the doors of Council Houses. This has been taken up with both South Northants Council and the Parish Council. We hope for an early successful outcome.

There were two ladies who came to talk to us. One of them was an undercover worker whose job was to gain the trust and confidence of drug users to encourage them to use clean needles. They highlighted the fact that Drugs are no longer only available to the rich. Drugs can be purchased by anyone with just a couple of pounds in their pockets. Dealers do not discriminate, they will sell to anyone who has the money in order to feed their own habit.

The ladies stressed that if anyone is concerned about anyone they think may be on Drugs that they call the Drugs Helpline anonymously. The number is in the Chronicle & Echo most evenings.

On a happier note, we send our love and congratulations to Esther for her Inauguration as the Diocesan Mother's Union President. The special service will take place on 25th March at St Barnabus Church, Wellingborough. Esther will be very much in our prayers as she begins her new role at a time when exciting changes are taking place within the Mother's Union.

Caring for your cat

Kittens

Kittens are old enough to leave their mother at eight weeks. Remember, however, that he or she will become a cat, after six months – perhaps for the next fourteen years. A kitten should be yours for life!

Neutering

The League advocates the neutering of all cats not required for breeding, in order to keep down the number of strays. One female cat can, in five years, be responsible for some 20,000 descendants and many of these must inevitably become homeless.

Both male and female cats can be neutered at five months or older. In the case of the male, a simple routine operation only is involved. The female requires a longer operation which, although routine, usually necessitates a return to the veterinary surgery after seven to ten days for the removal of stitches.

Neutering produces a much more satisfactory and enjoyable pet. A neutered male should refrain from spraying about the house and leaving an unpleasant smell; he should also be declined to wander or fight. It is not correct that a female cat should be allowed, on humane grounds, to have one litter before neutering.

Health

Feline Enteritis and Cat Flu – Many cats and kittens die every year from these diseases. If not already inoculated against feline enteritis and cat flu, your new pet should have this done as soon as it has settled in. This can be done at 12 weeks of age or older. Your vet will give you a certificate – keep it safely, for many boarding catteries will not accept a boarder without one; remember that booster injections will be needed.

Teeth – many older cats suffer from tartar on the teeth which can cause great discomfort to the cat but is usually removable by a veterinary surgeon. The formation of tartar can often be avoided by giving large pieces of meat or safe non-splinter bones to chew.

First Aid – With Scalds or Burns, due to fire, hot fat, boiling water, acid, etc., use plenty of running cold water, dab dry and apply Vaseline frequently. The cold water will reduce pain and shock – but do not expect co-operation from your cat! If concerned about minor burns and scalds and in all more serious cases, seek veterinary advice at once.

Always consult your veterinary surgeon if you are concerned about your cat's health. He is the expert and is there to help and advise.

A healthy cat or kitten has bright, dry eyes, a nose clear of discharge but not dry or cracked, lips free from saliva and glossy, clean fur.

Grooming

Regular grooming of your cat is advised, especially for long-haired

breeds. Brushing and combing will remove loose hair, dirt and dust and the occasional flea that he may pick up. Grooming will also prevent furballs which can be harmful and form in the cat's stomach when he constantly licks loose fur.

Pork in BBQ Sauce

Belly Pork Strips – Pork Chops or Steaks	1 onion
1 tbsp brown sugar	1 tbsp tomato puree
Pinch salt	¼ pint water
Green pepper	2 tbsp vinegar
½ tsp Paprika	Thicken with cornflour

Cut Pork into strips if using belly. Place in oven proof dish, bake at 200°C or gas mark 6 for 30 minutes. Peel and chop onion and pepper and fry until soft. Add rest of ingredients and mix well. Drain off any excess fat from pork, and pour sauce over. Return to oven and cook for further 25/30 minutes

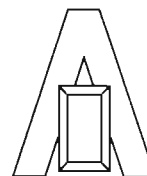

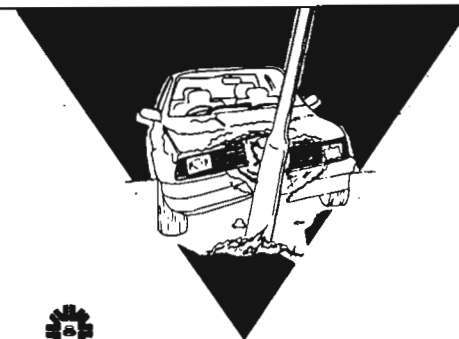

The existing social building and changing rooms are to be leased to the Rugby Club on a long term basis so that more effective maintenance and use of them is made. They will still remain available to all Playing Field users and remain the property of the Playing Fields Association.

The Playing Fields Annual General Meeting will be held on Thursday 27th April at 8.00pm at the Playing Fields.

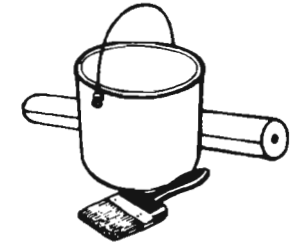
