BUGBROOKE ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION

It is now 2 1/2 years since the association were forced to vacate the Gayton Road site. During this time the Parish Council have explored a number of possibilities for providing allotments, unfortunately with no success. The Parish Council in conjunction with the association have agreed that in order to provide allotments for the village, land will have to be compulsorily purchased. A number of sites are now under consideration, & the association have been asked to indicate their preference by the end of April. This will therefore be the major item for discussion at the annual general meeting of the allotment association which will be held at the Sunday School on Weds. 24th April at 8.00 p.m., all members and anyone interested in acquiring an allotment are urged to attend.

Remaining in the West End area, the Parish Council's request for kerbing and a weight restriction (buses excepted) has not been met with any enthusiasm by the County Council who state that the kerbing in this area has a low priority rating and that they have no staffing resources at present to investigate the suggested weight restriction. The Parish Council were reluctant to accept this situation and will pursue the matter with the County Council.

The question of the provision of allotments has not been forgotten. The officers of the Allotment Association have viewed a number of possible sites and will report their findings to all the members of their Association. A recommendation will then be submitted to the Parish Council regarding the acquisition of the most suitable site, if necessary by Compulsory Purchase proceedings.

A copy of the County Structure Plan has been sent to the Parish Council for any comments they may have - which must be received by the County Council by the 24th May. The Plan makes Bugbrooke a limited development village which, by the year 2001, will have 110 additional houses and 2 small industrial estates.

A letter was received from the County Council upon the Transport Bill. The County Council were opposed to this Bill which they consider would reduce the existing bus services by ending the practice of cross-subsidisation (i.e. where part of the income from profitable routes helps towards the cost of less profitable routes).

Councillors Jack Holt and Ken Gardner are to plug the gap in the hedge at the grassed area in Homestead Drive which is used as a short cut to Champion School. Mr Roberts, the Headteacher at the school, will be only too pleased if dog owners are discouraged from taking "walkies" on the school playing fields and leaving health hazards, in their wake.

The Parish Council also considered one or two minor planning applications, approved various accounts, noted that their collection for Cancer Research had raised over £248 and were reminded that the Annual Parish Meeting will take place on the 15th April.

Dr. McQuillan who is the District Medical Officer, is the President, and the Health Education Council initially helped financially to set this group up, now this is self financed. The present secretary is Mr. Chaffer who lives in Harpole - 6 Manor Close, Harpole - telephone number 830639.

There are about 30 to 40 active members and their spouses who attend the monthly meetings, the 1st Wednesday of each month at 7.30 p.m. at Nether Heyford Village Hall. Usually there is half an hours physical activity organised by Mrs Edwina Pearcey, who is a P.E. Teacher at Duston and provides this service and runs this group voluntarily, which she has been doing since the group started.

The Club has been going nearly 8 years very successfully. Any person who is interested in heart disease, or has any problem and wishes to be helped by such a self help group, can contact Mr Chaffer who will provide further information. The activity of the Club, besides regular monthly meetings, involves visiting and advising people on coronary heart disease.
