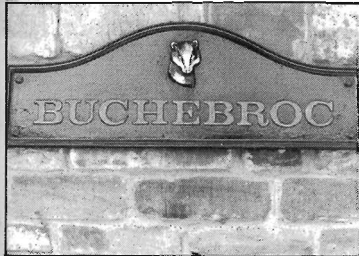
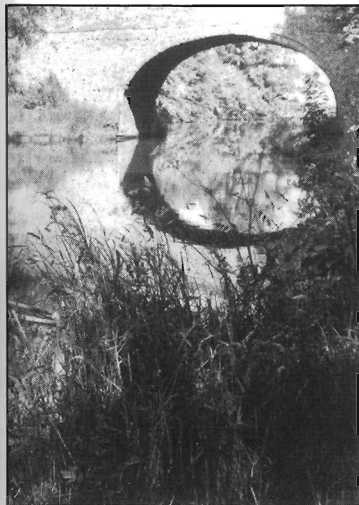

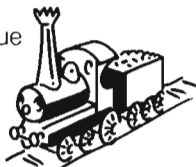

Nature Notes by Bill Lantsbury

I say, what about this for a bit of British Summer? Temperatures in the upper 80's, banks of the M1 on fire because of the drought and the roads melting? Hotter some days than in the Mediterranean. I saw some building workers with a really nice tan!

From a gardening point of view, I like the hot weather. All that is needed is plenty of hose and you get some splendid results.

I did not get a splendid result from one of my gooseberry bushes. I saw that a few leaves were missing from the top but I did nothing about it. The next time I looked over half of the leaves were gone and when I focussed closely on the bush I saw that there were hundreds of tiny caterpillars all gnawing away. The gooseberry sawfly had paid a visit and that bush was stripped.

One very pleasant thing has happened in the garden. We had a spotted fly catcher nest in the pyracantha on the front wall. We could see the birds performing their wonderful fly catching act as we sat and ate our meals. What a delightful pair of birds. They both helped with the nest building. When mother was sitting on the eggs, father caught plenty of flies and fed her. When the eggs hatched they both worked terribly hard to catch thousands of flies and pop them into those ever open mouths.

I did not see them fly out of the nest but I did see an adult fly catcher and a young one catching flies in the field at the back, we could do with more fly catchers coming to us each year. I see the book says they winter in tropical Africa!

My informant, Julian Moulton, tells me three special birds have been seen. A spoonbill and a red necked grebe at Pitsford reservoir.

A hobby has been seen near Upton. This bird I am told can catch a swift or a swallow and eat it!

I find it rather amusing about the apple crop this year. When the blossom was on the trees, people were saying there would be few apples because the cold weather had killed many of the bees. There would be no pollination.

I have never seen so many apples on most of the trees. In fact, at the moment thousands are falling off maybe due to the drought. I think those nasty winds did a bit of pollination.

WALKING IN THE COUNTRYSIDE

The Nene Way. The County Council are planning a path, waymarked and stiled etc, from Badby along the River Nene Valley to end at Wansford near Peterborough. This path is only in outline at present and land owners will be consulted in due course. There are only very few parts which are not following existing rights of way. I will keep you informed as to the progress of this venture.

As you drive (or better, walk) round the countryside of Northamptonshire you will see some new footpath and bridleway signs where a footpath leaves a road. These new signs are marked "Public Footpath" of just "Footpath". In future all new ones will show "Footpath" only. This means that there is a right of way just in the same way as the old signs "Public Footpath to..." told you there was a right of way. By having a more simple sign, the County Council can provide many more than previously. Remember that it is a statutory duty for the County Council to provide a notice where a footpath or bridleway meets a road. There is a new sign on the road just out of Nether Heyford towards Bugbrooke.

By the time this is in print most of the crops will have been harvested and the paths once more clear. Often, winter is the best time for walking.

Can I ask everyone to leave the black and white public footpath signs where they are and not to remove them. They cost 25p each and the Parish Council pays for them. Also, I have to go and replace them!!

KNOW YOUR VILLAGE...No:-2 "WHAT'S IN A NAME?"

I am sure we all know that Bugbrooke was mentioned in the Domesday Book exactly 900 years ago as Buchebroc. Its exact meaning is rather uncertain; it could have been the winding brook, the badger's drinking place, the goat's or even the buck's drinking place. All these are feasible in view of the fact that the village was surrounded by forest.

The origins of the names of the village streets are also uncertain. Camp Hill - but whose camp? High Street and Church Lane are even today self-explanatory. Other smaller "streets" have disappeared, such as Kiln Yard where the brick kilns were. Some of the more recent street names are easier to reconcile; here are a few:

PILGRIMS LANE was named after John Pilgrim who died in 1844 leaving the sum of £50 to be spent on books for the Sunday School Children.

LEVITTS ROAD owes its name to Joseph Levitt who was a plumber and glazier and one of the first appointed deacons of the Baptist Chapel in the village. He was "a truly pious, active man and an excellent singer" who died in 1821.

SMITHERWAY: In the fifteenth century there was a track leading from the top of Pilgrims Lane to Cuckoo Barn; its original name was Smith Way.

CHIPSEY AVENUE: The land on which these houses are built originally belonged to the "Blue Coat School", now the Northampton Grammar School for Boys, which was built in 1541 by Thomas Chipsey.

SPENCER CLOSE: This also has connections with the Grammar School, being the name of one of the house-teams there. It also, of course, has current Royal connections.

MOORES CLOSE: This is built upon land which once belonged to Moores Farm.

THE ANVIL, of course is the original site of the village smithy.

MERRIEFIELD FARM dates back before 1700.

GREAT LANE was once known as Post Office Lane, the Post Office being situated on the corner.

ACE LANE used to be called Little Lane.

Within the village many house-names relate to previous uses and point of interest: The Olde Bakehouse, Myrtle Cottage, Appletree Cottage, Holly Bank (there was also once an Ivy

Cottage nearby and Vine Cottage stood behind School Cottages, now the Primary School Garden), Quaker Cottage, the Byre and so the list goes on, there are many, many more if you look for them. The village is its own self-perpetuating history book.

O.A.P. CONCESSIONARY BUS FARES.

After the 25th. October the now familiar "Bus Passes" will be replaced by a system of "Tokens" which can be offered in part payment for Bus Fares. This will be funded jointly by the South Northamptonshire District Council and the Parish Council. In order to assess the number of "Eligible Participants" who will be applying for tokens Mr. Terry Ward has kindly agreed to a list being placed in the Post Office where persons can indicate their intention to apply. This should be done **at the very latest by 30th. August** in order that the necessary tokens can be obtained for distribution at a time and place to be advertised later. "Eligible Participants are as follows.

- A. Women over 60 years of age who are not employed more than 20 hours per week.
- B. Men over 65 years of age who are not employed more than 20 hours per week.
- C. Persons suffering from any disability or injury which in the opinion of the Authority seriously impairs their ability to walk.
- D. Registered Blind Persons.

As with any new scheme there are bound to be "Teething Troubles" and we do ask for your co-operation.

Anne Howard's Cookhouse Door

There must be many readers who are vegetarians - if you are try this recipe:-

Vegetables cooked in a homely manner (Serves 4)

- 2 lb (900 g) potatoes, peeled
 4 oz (110 g) Cheddar cheese
 1 onion, peeled
 2 tablespoons oil
 salt and freshly ground black pepper
 3 leeks, washed and finely chopped
 1 lb (450 g) carrots, scrubbed and diced
 1 small cauliflower, divided into florets
 1/2 lb (255 g) mushrooms, wiped and sliced
 2 tablespoons oil
 2 teaspoons fresh parsley or rosemary

For the topping:

- 4 oz (110 g) grated cheese
 1 tablespoon fresh parsley,
 finely chopped

Pre-heat the oven to gas mark 4, 350 deg.F (180 deg.C). Grate the raw potatoes, cheese and half the onion by hand or in a food processor. Mix in 2 tablespoons of oil and season well. Press this mixture into a 9 inch (23 cm) deep pie-dish, building up the sides to form a shell. Bake in the oven for 45 minutes until the crust is just beginning to brown.

Meanwhile prepare the vegetables. Heat 2 tablespoons of oil and fry the remaining onion (chopped), leeks, carrots and cauliflower florets slowly for 5-10 minutes, turning them over in the pan. Then add the sliced mushrooms and continue cooking all the vegetables for a further 5 minutes with the pan covered. Add the herbs, salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Next pile the vegetables into the baked cheese and potato crust and sprinkle 4 oz (110 g) cheese mixed with 1 tablespoon chopped parsley over the top. Bake for 20 minutes until the edges of the shell look crisp and the cheese has melted. Serve hot.

The beauty of this dish is that it can be easily adapted to whatever vegetables are in season.

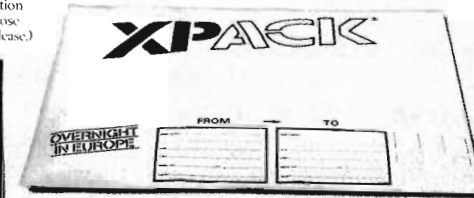

Campion Mixed Hockey Club

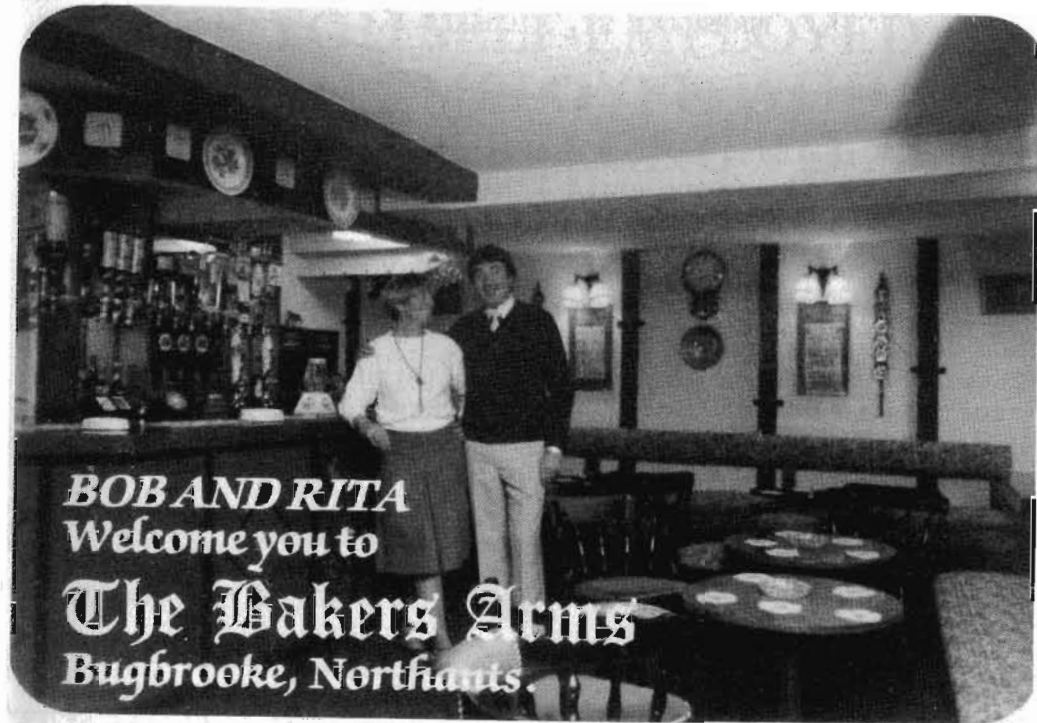

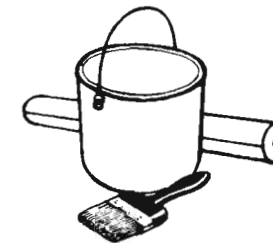
