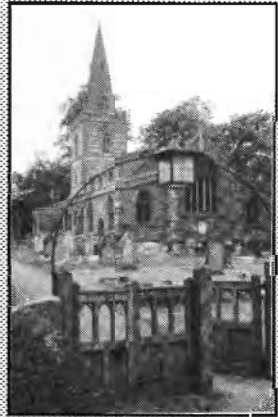

Parish Council Meetings

July and August

South Northamptonshire Council have produced a draft Local Plan for the development of the district to the year 2006. During this period the intention is to provide 6,200 dwellings: 2,480 in rural areas, 1,950 in Towcester and 1,800 in Brackley. The Plan envisages Bugbrooke's status changing from a limited development village to a village for restricted infill only. This is intended to significantly reduce the scale of development in the village. However, as almost every available space within the village boundary has already been developed, such a reduction was inevitable – at least until the instigators of this plan at South Northamptonshire decide to expand the village boundary. Nonetheless a local plan is desirable as it might prevent developers ignoring the needs of the village.

Continuing the Parish Council's quest to improve street lighting; the East Midlands Electricity's officer responsible for street lighting has accepted an invitation to talk to Parish Councillors and suggest the most effective ways to achieve the desired improvement. The situation is not helped by the 25 lamp-posts which East Midlands Electricity believe are in such a poor condition that they should be replaced at a total cost of around £10,000. Bearing in mind that the County Council's annual budget is only around £13,000, the scale of the problem can be appreciated. Nonetheless, the intention is to replace these poles in the next two to three years as well as continuing the programme of improvements started this year. A bonus in this respect has emerged in a proposal from East Midlands Electricity, with financial assistance from the County Council, to replace wooden poles in the High Street with underground cabling. With an appropriate donation from the Parish Council, four poles, from the primary school to Elm Tree Bank, should be replaced with upmarket ornamental lamp-posts. The down side, however, is that the poles concerned are also used by British Telecommunications (BT) who have no plans for underground cabling!

The regular topic of policing arose again and PC Wallace took note of a list of problems ranging from vandalism to illegal and careless parking, particularly by the primary school. The wider issue of law enforcement related to the Parish Council's support of an initiative from Kislingbury Parish Council about the lack of police presence and the subsequent rise in crime in local villages. Having taken up Kislingbury Parish Council's suggestion and written to our MP, Mr Michael Morris, members were a little surprised to hear that a meeting had taken place

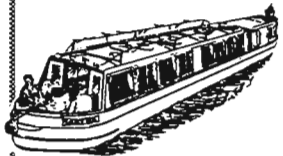

between Mr Morris and Kislingbury Parish Council to which no representative of any other parish had been invited. The question of etiquette, however, pales into insignificance against the urgent need for a local village policeman. Those who decide police policy are convinced that they need to organise the Force in such a way as to find no place either now or in the future for the old fashioned village bobby. The Parish Council believe that whatever the resource problems (which I am sure are genuine) the withdrawal of the police from the community is a serious mistake.

Maintaining the theme of law and order and unsocial behaviour; there has been an increase this summer in the dumping of garden rubbish. This is not only an offence but is also unnecessary as such rubbish can legitimately be placed in the wheeled bin provided to each household by the District Council.

A muted cheer was raised when it was realised that a number of potholes throughout the village were being filled and a hasty telephone call was made to the Highways Department to point out those holes which had not been marked but which they might like to fill in whilst they were in the area. Yet another request will be made to the Highways Department, (in the hope that they have mellowed over the years) for a vehicle weight limit to be imposed at Great Lane so that the only heavy vehicles permitted would be public service buses and, presumably, the emergency services. Similar requests made regularly over the past few years have been rebuffed.

Finally, in order to refute the notion that the only duty of a parish councillor is to prate once a month in the village hall, I continue to highlight the various extraneous duties and responsibilities which individual members are expected to undertake. The meetings in July and August saw Vice-Chairman Aubrey Howard appointed to the Charity Trustees, John Sexton re-appointed as the Council's representative on the primary school governing body and Ken Gardner and Sue Pace appointed as snow officers (Mrs Pace already being a blizzard officer, this represents a meteorological rise to fame).

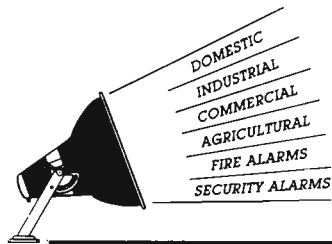

Churchyard Collection

Thank you collectors and everyone who contributed. In all we raised over £1000 which is better than last year and will ensure the tools to keep your churchyard looking tidy. It's beauty is often commented on by visitors to the village who are often expecting an untidy, ill-kept place. We are one of the largest village churchyards in Northamptonshire.

"I Believe and Trust"

This is the name of a course designed specially by the Mothers' Union to equip all Christians with a better knowledge of their faith as we move through the Decade of Evangelism. There are seven sessions when group work and bible study are used to look at different areas of belief. It requires no previous knowledge and each session can stand on its own. You are welcome to come to one or all of the sessions which we will offer in the next months. On the launch evening we shall show you the course and invite you to take part in the first session led by leaders who have already received training themselves. People often say to me that they are ashamed at how little they really know about their belief – here is the chance to remedy that in a gentle and friendly atmosphere. Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer – November 28

There will be a list of ideas for thanksgiving and prayer and books of prayers and a bible to help you in your praying. 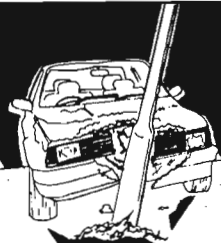

Neighbourhood Watch

'Neighbourhood Watch is a localised scheme, community led which forges a partnership between the police and the community, with the primary aim of reducing crime and the fear of crime'.

About 3 years ago some residents in one section of Bugbrooke set up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme in that part of the village. Gradually this scheme has extended until now about two-thirds of the village is in the scheme. As the new Watch Co-ordinator for the village I would like to extend the scheme so that every street in the village is covered. If this is to happen it does need people in those streets not yet covered to volunteer to act as contact people. Ideally we would like each contact person to be responsible for no more than 20 houses, so the longer streets really need more than one person. If you think that your street is not in the scheme and you would be willing to become a contact person, please contact me (831363) to let me know.

A meeting has been arranged for the contact people at 8.00 p.m. on 21st October at which P.C. Watts, the Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator will speak about the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and will explain the role of the contact person.

Crime is a growth industry and unfortunately criminals do operate in Bugbrooke. Car thefts, thefts from cars, burglaries, bike thefts have all taken place this year. We cannot rely solely on the police to prevent or reduce these crimes. The 'local bobby' is a thing of the past. We as a community must be more careful (lock doors and windows, do not leave items lying around) and more aware and vigilant. We must be more willing to do something if we see any suspicious incidents - this is

Now the moth. Roy Cunningham from Lime Grove rang me up just a few days ago to say he had seen a lovely moth. It was hovering in front of a flower and putting its 'tongue' out to get the nectar. Roy rang the Irchester Country Park and they told him it would be a Humming Bird Hawk Moth. I was told that I ought to contact Paul Humphries because he could tell me something about mink! He said he was fishing in the canal at the top of 'Lovers Lane' along the Heyford road when he had a mink near his keep net. He scared it off and then another fisherman at the next peg said he had two young mink around him. Paul said he had also seen a mink running along the bank at Rainbow's bridge. So they are everywhere now. I think one bird, the moorhen, has rapidly decreased in numbers with the arrival of the mink.

Along the Gayton road, just over the canal, you could often see dozens of moorhens running about the field. Now there are none. We often saw one in the field just at the back here. Not any more.

I feel I must say a word or two about the August weather. What has it been, the windiest, the wettest, the wildest since goodness knows when. Cars have been crushed by falling trees. A man was struck dead by lightening and the coasts were really battered by the huge waves. Now September is here, perhaps it will be lovely!

One last thought. The weather may have been foul but the flowers have been beautiful and have we ever had better runner beans!

P.S. 14th September. I wish I had not mentioned better weather. For the whole of yesterday morning the rain was absolutely torrential and more is forecast for this afternoon. Oh dear!

Do you think the running of Councils should be locally controlled or centralised?

The running of Councils should be at local level where the local expertise and knowledge is readily available. The other is too remote for most local issues.

How would you like to be remembered?

As a kind and happy person.

Do you have any pet dislikes?

Tripe and eels.

Were you ever involved with youth and young people at all?

Close association with the Girl Guide Movement where I was a Commissioner for some years.

If you could live in any part of the world, where would it be?

It could only be England.

What are your hopes and fears for the future of our country?

My fears are for the young whose opportunities are so disappointing, and my hopes are that having come out of other recessions I trust that we shall do so again.

Do you have any advice for young people starting out in life?

To enjoy whatever they are doing even if it is not exactly what they would have liked.

Betty's Pantry – TASTY WAYS WITH TOMATOES

TOMATO SOUP WITH GARLIC CROÛTONS

Soup

1 x 15ml spoon oil
100g lean bacon finely diced
1 stick of celery, sliced
450g fresh ripe tomatoes, skinned and quartered
1 carrot, peeled and finely diced
25g cornflour
900ml chicken stock
Bouquet garni
Pinch of dried basil
Salt and black pepper
Pinch of sugar

Croûtons

4 slices stoneground bread
2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
2 x 15ml spoons vegetable oil

Method

Heat the 15ml spoonful of oil in a large saucepan, then sauté the bacon, celery, tomatoes and carrot together for 10 minutes.

Blend the cornflour with a little stock. Add this to the rest of the stock and stir well before pouring into the saucepan. Bring to the boil. Add the bouquet garni and basil. Simmer for 1 hour. Discard the bouquet garni. Remove from the heat and purée or pass through a fine sieve. Return to a clean saucepan. Season to taste and add the sugar.

To make the croûtons cut the bread into 1cm cubes or as desired. Fry the garlic in the oil for 1–2 minutes, then add the croûtons. Fry until golden brown. Drain well on kitchen paper. Sprinkle croûtons on soup.

Serves 4–6

PEPERONATA

Butter and olive oil for frying
1 medium size onion, peeled and finely chopped
4 large red peppers, cored, seeded and cut in strips
6 large tomatoes, skinned, quartered and seeded
1 tsp of sugar
Salt and black pepper
2 x 2 tbs chopped parsley

Method

Heat a knob of butter and 2 tbs of oil in a saucepan and when foaming, add the onion. Cook gently until soft. Add the peppers, cover with a lid and simmer gently for 15 minutes.

Add the tomatoes and sugar, salt and pepper to taste. Replace the lid and simmer for another 15 minutes or until the vegetables make a thick purée.

Remove from heat, taste for seasoning and transfer to a warmed serving dish. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve.
