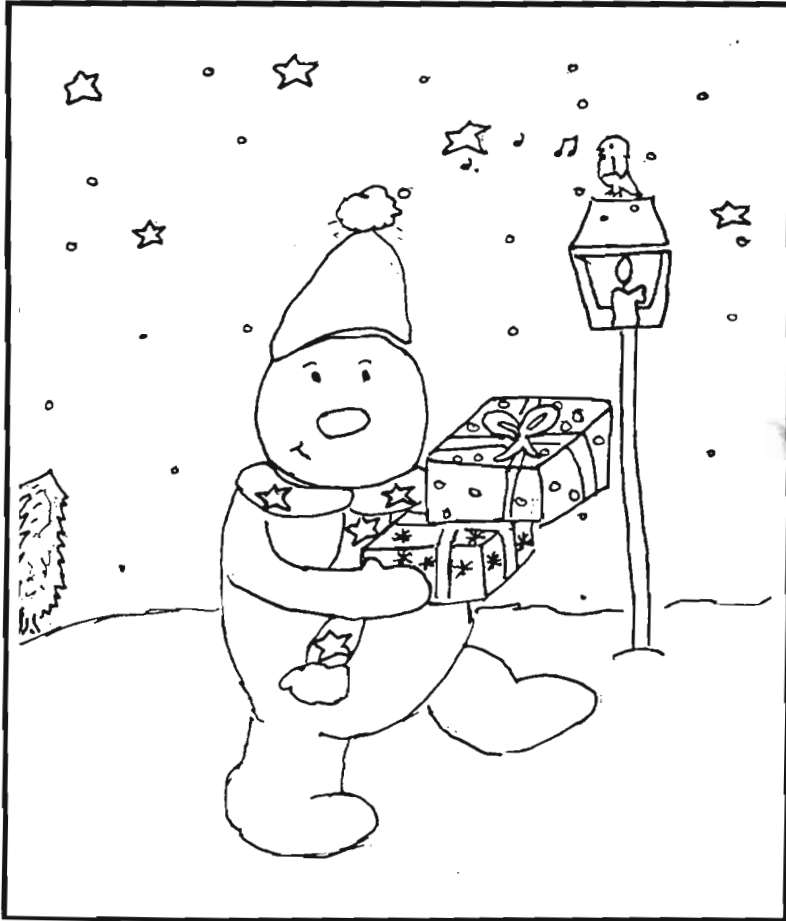

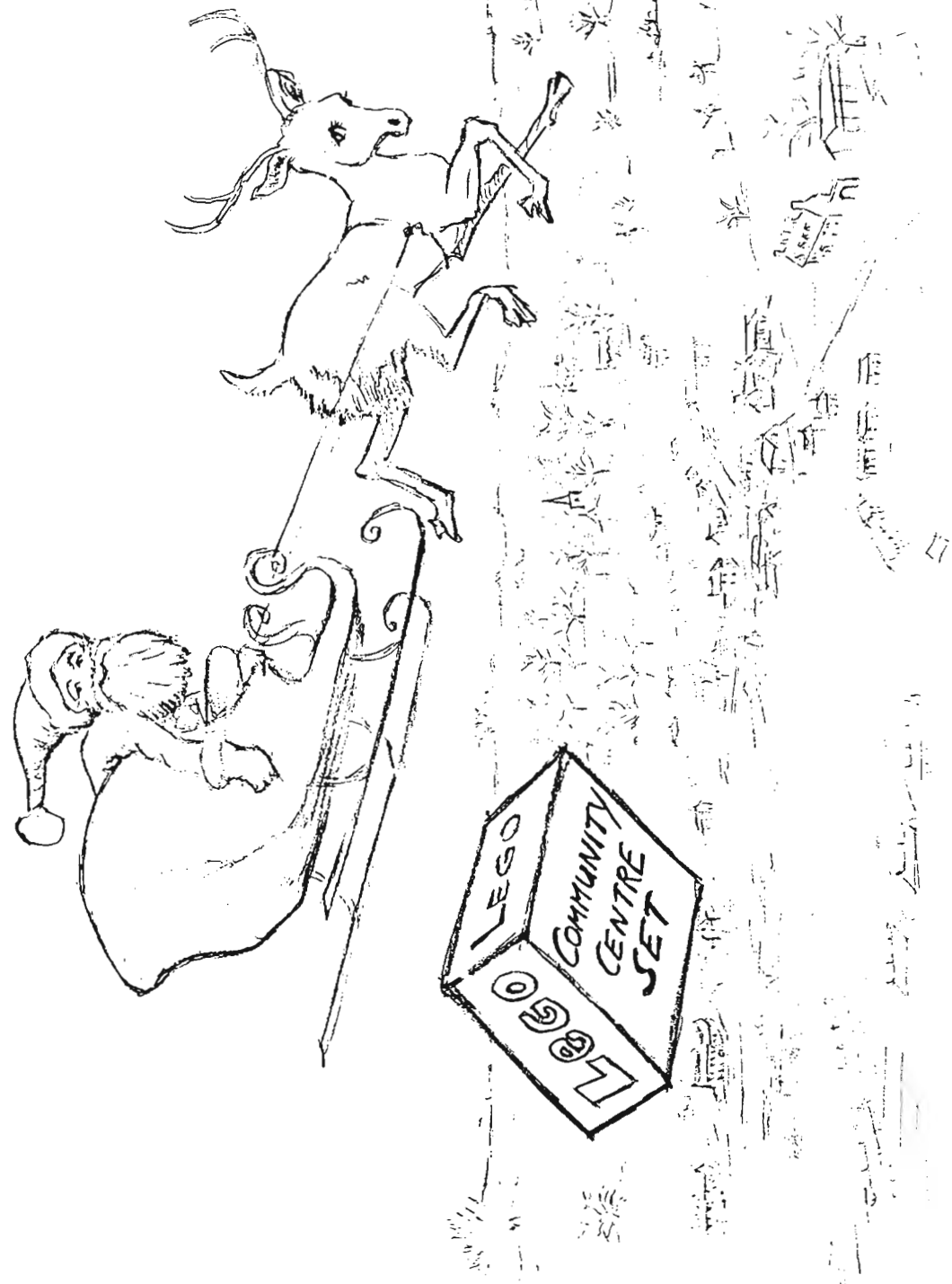

with sick and injured creatures and now she has gone, Bugbrooke has lost a very kind and loving lady.

Now a word about the weather. I think we have had some lovely sunshine in October but things went a bit wrong last Monday the 28th. I had to go to a meeting in the Village Hall and I had the greatest difficulty to fight my way there against a dreadful wind. It was the end of Hurricane Lily that had come across the Atlantic. Thousands of homes lost their electricity through falling trees etc. Thank goodness it only lasted one night!

I watched a television programme last night about creatures around the coasts of Australia. I think these wildlife programmes get better and better. I was pleased to see there was a programme one night giving awards to the people who take these lovely pictures. Prince Philip was present and David Attenborough was commentating.

Phil Bignell tells me that one night his wife opened the door and a fox stood looking at her! I hear there are still thousands of rabbits about and they can do a lot of damage. We seem to have lots of grey squirrels in the garden.

Evie and I saw a jaybird land on a headstone in the churchyard. It has been a long time since I saw a jay. I read from the bird book that it eats acorns and it stores some in the ground and they often grow into oak trees!

My son David has taken me over to Heyford and shown me a group of Scots Pine trees. They are very dead. Some time ago he saw some dark, long, wasp-like flies settling on the trees. They were a type of sawfly. They laid their eggs in the bark and when the grub hatched out it ate into the tree. Now there are hundreds of holes in the trees where the creature has eaten its way out. The hole is about 1/2cm wide. He has brought me two of these dead flies. They are black with brown wings and have a long sharp point at the rear. About twice as long as a bee. No other types of trees were affected. The book name for this sawfly is a Sirex.

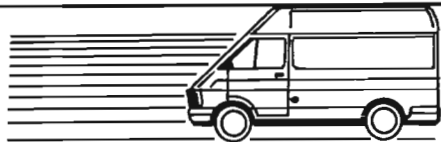

We began our year with a service in Church followed by a cup of tea. Our first speaker since the summer holidays was Jenny Loasby from the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, founded in 1700.

This was a very interesting and thought provoking evening. She told of the different images of Christ around the world from being gentle and mild to angry and grotesque, a black loving shepherd with a lamb on his shoulder, or in Japan amongst the pergodas.

Our beetle drive afternoon was again a great success, a chance for members to have some fun and a chat.

The Deanery meeting at Harpole was well attended by all the M.U. branches. A speaker gave a very interesting talk about women's influence on Christianity. This was followed by an excellent supper and 'bring and buy' sale.

Neighbourhood Watch

The Area Commander responsible for policing our village, which forms part of the Towcester sector came to talk at the Parish Council meeting in October. He was supported by P.C. Gary Wood, who is our local Police Officer. It was a great pity that despite the publicity for this event, only a bare handful of residents were sufficiently interested to attend. I believe that we get the policing which we deserve, and on this showing, we don't deserve much!

Superintendent Vickers explained that there were two immediate response vehicles, and two general purpose vehicles to serve this sector, so that it was inevitable that on non urgent matters, occasionally the response would not be as quick as might be desired, but he assured the meeting that in the event of a real emergency, the response would be both quick and efficient. There is also a C.I.D. officer assigned to this area.

He stressed that serious crime such as drugs, violence, and firearms offences, etc had to receive priority. Most crimes in Bugbrooke were committed by 'outsiders', not local people. The most serious form of crime in the area was theft of and from cars, with a clear up rate of 57 per cent.

It was interesting to note that the majority of cases where the miscreants were caught, were as a result of information given to the police by Neighbourhood Watch. The Superintendent emphasized that anyone who saw anything of a suspicious nature should not hesitate to contact the police immediately.

There followed a question and answer session, from which it emerged that there was a problem with loutish behaviour on the open area behind the houses in Badgers Close. It was agreed that this area should receive closer police attention.

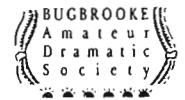

Nurse's Corner



Christmas Creepy Crawlies

How many unwanted guests will you have in your house this Christmas?

Pillows, like duvets and mattresses are a natural reservoir for the house-dust mite. A tenth of the weight of the average five-year-old pillow can be made up of house-dust mites and their droppings! Traditionally, asthmatics have been told to steer clear of feather pillows and opt for foam ones, but recent research suggests that the latter can harbour up to three times as many mite droppings as the former (it is the droppings which trigger the asthma). In reality, it probably makes no difference which type you opt for, as long as you wash them regularly, cover them with anti-allergen pillowcases and don't keep them any longer than five years.

Another beastie - head lice - can affect all ages and sections of the community. Head lice are tiny flesh-coloured insects 1-2mm long, which stay close to the scalp. Old egg shells 'nits' are white and shiny and are found further along the hair shaft. Finding nits alone does not necessarily mean a person still has live head lice. Finding out if your family has head lice is very simple - lice are easily detected by combing

wet hair. It is a good idea to comb the hair with a detection comb at least once a week. The scalp may itch due to the saliva lice inject into the skin as they feed.

If you find head lice there are two ways to deal with them.

1) Wash hair in the normal way with ordinary shampoo, and, using hair conditioner while the hair is very wet, comb through to the roots with a fine tooth comb. Clear the comb of lice between each stroke, and if you find any lice, repeat the routine every 3-4 days so that emerging lice are cleared before they can spread.

2) You could use an insecticidal lotion, available from the local chemist on prescription, to kill lice and eggs. Be thorough and cover all the head (there is no need for everyone in the house to be treated) and use a detection comb for 7-10 days after treatment.

agreed to attend the Parish Council Meeting in October. He began by outlining the operational organisation of the Force and the need for the community to be alert and active in the prevention of crime. After this the Parish Councillors and a number of local residents launched into him with their concerns about the level of policing that is available to the village (which is negligible) and the lack of information to the Neighbourhood Watch Group. The general concern remains the loss of a village bobby, who could often deal with trouble before it began, and the general withdrawal of the Police from the community – a tour through the village in a car is not seen as adequate. To his credit, Superintendent Vickers retained his composure and sense of humour during this onslaught and at least agreed to discuss some specific problems with individuals and improve contacts with Neighbourhood Watch. It is clear, however, that so far as Northamptonshire Police is concerned, the day of the village bobby is past.

Next in the firing line were the County Council Highways Department. Officers of that Department, together with the Chief Executive of South Northamptonshire Council, attended the first Community Forum in the County. This was an open meeting held at Campion School for the residents of Bugbrooke, Kislingbury and Nether Heyford and the issue under discussion was traffic. The officers fielded questions, comments and criticism, mainly about lorry movements, rat runs, traffic calming measures, through traffic and the likely future build up of traffic. Also discussed was the amazing shrinking bridge in Nether Heyford. It has already become too low for lorries to pass under and, if left unattended, in a few year's time only limbo dancers will be able to use it.

Although there are severe restrictions on the restrictions on lorries which the Highways Department can impose, the County Council officers undertook to arrange a meeting with a number of local haulage firms in view of the disquiet of some residents of the three villages.

The experts seemed to have changed their minds about the use of so called traffic calming measures, and 'throttles' (where roads are deliberately narrowed) are no longer favoured for straight approaches to villages. It was strongly emphasised from the floor, however, that some form of traffic calming is expected at the Camp Hill entrance to the new Community Centre.

Another rather disconcerting fact emerging from the Forum was the 'management by congestion' policy now openly adopted by the Government and local authorities. The intention is to make driving so uncomfortable that drivers are driven off the road. This policy will be particularly noticeable in this area when the massive development at St Crispin and 'west of Northampton' as proposed in the revised County Structure Plan becomes a reality.

Continuing the Structure Plan theme, the Parish Council have asked

the County Council to define the term 'west of Northampton' where the revised Structure Plan expects the development of at least 1,000 houses as part of the Government's requirement for 50,000 new houses in the County by the year 2016. Having asked this question, however, the County Council plans seem to locate the houses in the Harpole area – hence our concern about the volume of traffic on the A45!

Meanwhile, changes in the Local Plan suggested by landowners to allow significant development in Bugbrooke have been rejected by the Inspector. Both South Northamptonshire Council and the Parish Council had objected to the proposed changes.

During all this activity normal Parish Council business was continuing. The Parish Council were pleased to receive plans for 3 terraced and 2 semi-detached houses at Badgers Close. This reflects the Parish Council policy of providing an element of smaller, more affordable housing in development plans. The quest for appropriately sited official low cost housing, involving a housing association, is still being pursued.

Finally, the play areas on the Merriefields Estate cannot be considered a success. They have caused problems for adjacent householders and the Parish Council for many years. Enquiries are being made about the legal position as to their future use. A number of ideas are being formulated and any other sensible suggestions will be seriously considered. All this depends, of course, on whether the legal status of the sites can be changed.

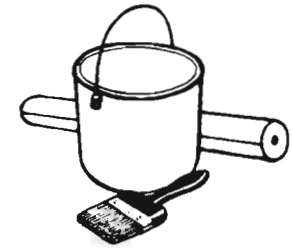

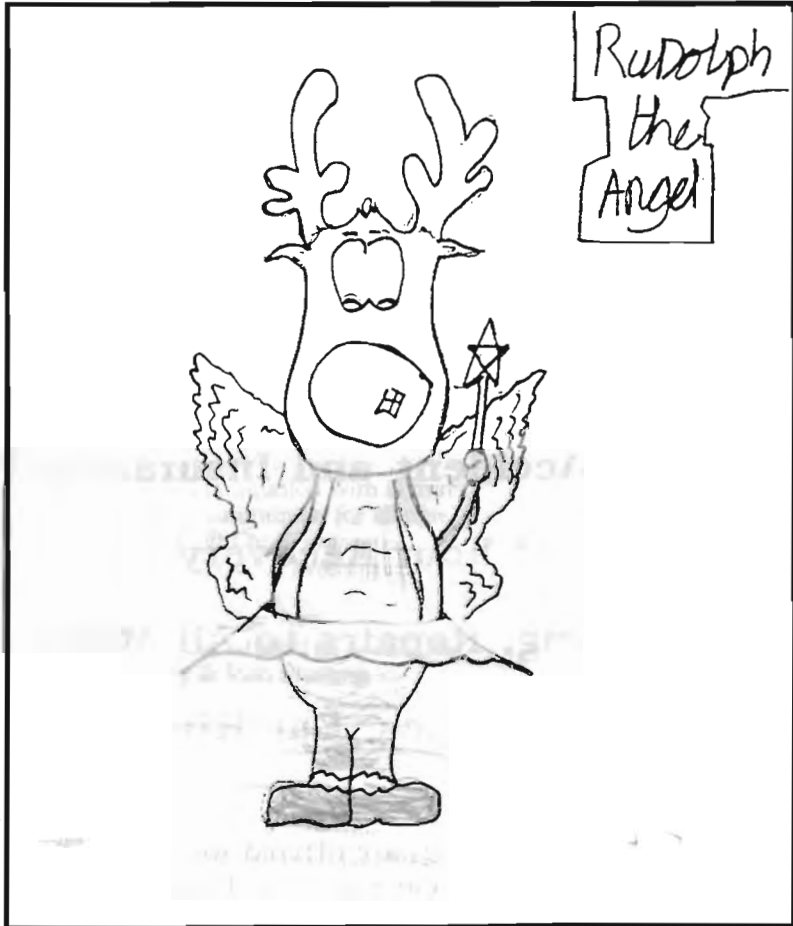
