*Additional Information*

In 1911 John Foley was a Sergeant in the Army Service Corps (ASC), No T/16330, with ten years' service and based at Woolwich (probably in married quarters). His wife, Ellen, was from Folkestone in Kent and they had a four year old daughter, Ivy. (His number prefix 'T' indicates that he was employed with horse transport).

John went to France with the ASC, attached to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Cavalry Division, landing on 6 October 1914. He ended the war as a Sergeant Major (Warrant Officer Class 2), and had been a Temporary Warrant Officer Class 1 (the most senior non-commissioned rank).

He qualified for the 1914 Star and Bar, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal, and was still serving in January 1920.
