Soldier in D Company, 1<sup>st</sup> Northants Regiment. No 7464. Invalided home 1914. The family lived on High St.

13<sup>th</sup> November school letter says: Received a post card from Fred Wooding at the front stating that he was wounded, and on Tuesday afternoon further word came from him stating that he was better. He had been struck on the side of the head by a piece of shrapnel or bullet, and but for the fact that it first hit a tree it would have killed him. - and later - Fred Wooding is now at no.1 convalescent depot, Boulogne. In the letter of the 18<sup>th</sup> December he is said to have been invalided home.

He received the British Service and Victory Medals, and was in the Class Z reserve in 1919, classed as an acting Lance Corporal.
