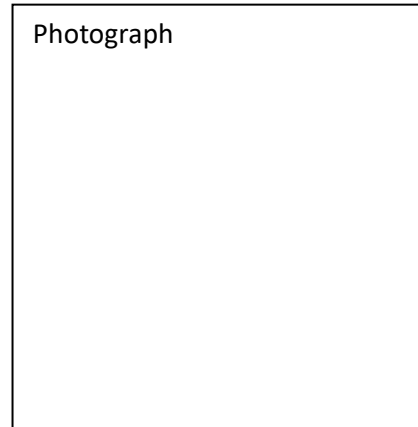

Frank JEFFERY was born in late 1899 at Rothersthorpe, one of 11 surviving children (of 18) of George JEFFERY, a farm labourer, and his wife Mary. [The children were born in Bugbrooke, Rothersthorpe and Pattishall, so it seems that George moved the family wherever there was work]. In 1911, George was working as a Canal Lock-keeper.

There is no definitive evidence of Frank serving in the armed forces, though there are records in that name [some partial service records (with no connection to this Frank or Bugbrooke), at least 20 Medal Index Cards (MICs) for 'F' or 'Frank' and four recipients of the Silver war Badge].

There were also at least three fatalities in this name, with one who was recorded as being from Bugbrooke, living in Weedon. This Private in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment enlisted at Coventry and his MIC is annotated with the note that he was actually 'T. JEFFREY'.

Frank would have been liable for conscription from late 1917, and the minimum age of 19 for serving overseas was removed in April 1918.

His later life is unknown, with no marriage or death confirmed.
