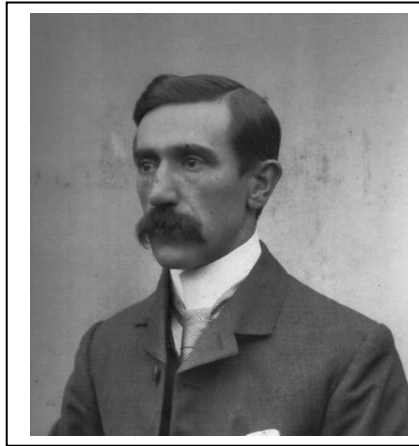

<i>Additional Information</i>

George COLLINS was one of three children of Thomas COLLINS, a butcher, and his wife Ellen.

He must have enlisted in late 1917 or early 1918, for after service in an Officer Cadet Battalion (possibly the 15th, as number 766550), he was appointed to a commission in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment on 29 May 1918, destined for its 3rd (Reserve) Battalion, which was on garrison duty at Dover.

However, he went to France as a rather young and inexperienced Second Lieutenant, arriving on 6 November 1918, where he must have served with another battalion, for the 3rd never left the UK; there were seven other battalions of the Royal Warwicks in France at this time.

For his brief service on the Western Front he qualified for the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. His release date is unknown and if his 'Officer's Personal Correspondence File' has survived it is not available at The National Archives, so no other service information can be found.

He married twice, and died on 12 August 1961 in Cheshire; his widow Rose Mary died in mid-1986.
